The day that Mike Saffran finished his final round of radiation, he rang the gong in the cancer centre so loudly that he surprised everybody within earshot. A man who was asleep jumped straight into the air!

Who can blame Mike, after 39 rounds of radiation?

That was in 2019. But in August of 2020, doctors found two spots of cancer in Mike's colon. Within a month he was on the

operating table, having the right side of his colon removed.

"It was tough. But the staff were just marvelous. They were compassionate, they cared, and they really wanted me to get better.

I'm cancer free, and that's why I'm able to be sitting here today talking to you.

I was born during the Depression. I'm 88 years old. At this point, I've been given a few extra years — so things are good!"

As Mike says, Windsor Regional Hospital "is part of our family." His mother and dad were cared for here, as were his brother and brother-in-law. All of his own children were born here, too.

"Truthfully, I don't know how the staff here do it. It's got to be tough. But everyone that I encountered was just amazing. From the check-in desk when you first arrive, to the bloodwork, then going to treatment. And I thank them for giving me such good care."

When Mike read in a donor newsletter about some medical equipment that our teams urgently needed, he felt like it was a great

way to give back to the hospital who had cared for him so much.

"I know that there is always a need for new equipment. So I phoned up the Foundation and said, 'I'm going to buy that machine for you. In payback, so to speak, for all the good care that I got."

"Here, you are treated with respect. It's a caring place, and the team here is something to behold. I am forever thankful for all the good work they've done."

Interview with the Doctor

Dr. Sabeena Misra is a Gastroenterologist and the Director of Endoscopy. We asked her how the Endoscopic Ultrasound which donors helped purchase is being used to save patients' lives.

What is the Endoscopic Ultrasound used to diagnose?

An endoscopic ultrasound (EUS) procedure is used to scan the inside of a patient's GI tract. It can detect pancreatic cancer as well as cancer that has spread to other parts of the body. It can look for cancer in the esophagus, stomach and small bowel, too.

How is it making a difference to patient care?

Having the Endoscopic Ultrasound here has eliminated the need for our patients to travel to London for this procedure — and means that our patients do not need to wait as long. It is very difficult for some of our patients to travel to London. Now that we have this machine in Windsor, this has taken the burden from the patients. It has also cut down the wait time, from a year down to one month - and even earlier depending on the seriousness of the disease.

How important is this diagnostic equipment to patients?

This is important in helping to make a diagnosis and treatment plan for cancer, specifically pancreatic



cancer. But not only diagnostics — the machine helps treat complications of pancreatitis such as a pancreatic cyst.

How does the Endoscopic Ultrasound help doctors provide the best care to patients?

We no longer have to wait until our patients are assessed in London. We can make decisions right here on the best course of action for our patients.

When Rosaire Lucier developed problems breathing, doctors knew he needed an endoscopic ultrasound.


For awhile, Rosaire had had problems eating. Food would get lodged in his esophagus, but if he tried to wash it down with water, he'd almost drown.

Rosaire was able to get his surgery right here in Windsor. He remembers the surgeons showing him the lesion when it was over — it was the size of his knuckle!
