Linda Hartley still doesn't know how she broke her back.

Back in May, she was pulling

weeds in her garden when her back began giving her pain.

Time went by, and as the pain got worse, Linda asked her doctor for some stronger pain medication.

Fortunately, her doctor recommended Linda call an ambulance and head to Emergency. That's when a CAT scan discovered two broken vertebrae in her back!

"I was in shock. I never expected it. I had no idea how it happened. When the first one broke it was painful but I could manage. But when the second one broke the pain was excruciating."

Linda was waiting patiently for surgery, but due to her heart condition, the anesthesiologist knew that her heart couldn't take an anesthetic.

So the medical teams found a way that Linda could be treated through radiology instead of surgery.

"They had to be very, very careful because it's in your spinal column. Fortunately, the radiologist that was doing

the procedure was very mindful of this, and everything went well. There were no incisions. I asked when I'd have my stitches out and they told me — there are no stitches!"

Linda reflects on what great care the nurses took of her during her stay.

"They were all very understanding, reassuring and helpful. And the doctor would come in regularly and visit me. He was very understanding and I really did appreciate his care."

Linda has osteoporosis, and is on dialysis, so Windsor Regional Hospital continues to play a big part in her daily life. That's given her the chance to see firsthand how important donors are to the hospital's high level of patient care.

"They need to keep on top of everything, and your equipment changes on a regular basis. They have to keep their equipment up to date so they can continue giving good service to their patients and the people who really, really need the care. Windsor's becoming an older population. There are more seniors now. So they have to keep up with the needs and keep up to date."

"The care was good. Really, really good. And without the support of the people of Windsor, where would we be today? Every penny helps. Any donation of any size — it all helps the Foundation to buy the equipment we all rely on."


Her nephew and niece knew how much their aunt cared about patients and families in our community. And how thrilled she would be about the new acute care hospital being planned for our region.

The hospital will replace the two aging regional hospital campuses that currently serve about 400,000 residents. The new facility will help care for the many retirees that our region is expecting over the next few years. It will also add more than 12,000 full-time positions over the course of its construction, including 1,200 workers on-site during the peak of construction.

And its research and training spaces will attract top applicants in their fields.
