

"We have to be personally responsible to make sure that each of us washes our hands."

Each area of the Campus will be part of the hand-washing blitz, which will include ongoing audits. Infection Control staff will work with individuals on each unit to discuss best practices and also respond to concerns about where hand-washing stations are located. If they are in an inappropriate location, they will be moved to a more convenient spot for easier access.

You will notice staff wearing buttons that read "Stop and Sanitize ... Clean Hands Save Lives" around the Campus to provide additional reminders. Volunteers will also be helping remind visitors who enter and exit the building.

David encourages staff to "lead by example" so that visitors will better understand the importance of hand-washing in reducing hospital-acquired infections.

"It makes a huge difference," he says. "When they see staff do it, they'll do it themselves."
