STUDENT NURSES' RESEARCH FOCUSES ON HELPING SENIORS

For many seniors, a sudden change in environment can not only be frightening, but also lead to delirium - a common syndrome among elderly patients that consists of abnormal thought, perception and awareness.

Student nurse, Elizabeth Zhang gave a presentation to Emergency Room staff last week that examined how to look for signs of delirium in patients; how to prevent it; and, what steps can be taken beyond the hospital walls to help reduce the incidence of a common ,yet preventable syndrome that can lead to prolonged hospital stays. "It happens very suddenly," said Zhang, who graduates this year from the University of Windsor. "The individual doesn't feel like him or herself."

Zhang's research describes delirium as "acute brain failure" whereby, a patient becomes disoriented, confused and starts acting abnormally due to a change in surroundings. Those at risk tend to be over age 65, those who are already suffering dementia - which results in faster mental decline, those who suffer from immobility,

malnutrition and dehydration, and may have suffered infections following surgery.

Her research indicates the morbidity rate for a patient who suffers delirium can be 35-50 per cent in one year. Such cases also tend to extend a patient's stay in hospital by more than two months. Zhang said an interprofessional approach is required

to prevent delirium. This includes further staff education, ensuring seniors have adequate fluids and meals where possible while in the ER, and reviewing their medication lists.

Also, it helps to take the steps used by the Geriatric Emergency Program nurses to help reorient confused patients. "If they don't know where they are, or what day of the week it is, we can reorient them and help decrease their confusion." Zhang said it's important to remind family members to bring glasses or hearing aids to their loved one to help reduce confusion.

Zhang pointed to programs in other jurisdictions that could be useful in helping reduce incidents of delirium. Norma Mamaril, a GEM program RN at the Ouellette campus, said she is optimistic about the possibility of a "Balance of Care" model - which began in the UK and has since started in Toronto - coming to Windsor. Mamaril said a Balance of Care program locally would focus on keeping seniors in the community, with a goal of reducing ER visits and movement to long-term care homes.
