It's hard to imagine what the local healthcare scene will look like 10 years from now, but Windsor Regional Hospital wants to show residents the possibilities.

Over the last 10 years, 23 new replacement hospitals have been built or are currently underway in Ontario. This kind of investment has the potential to transform communities into centres of healthcare excellence.

When Humber River Hospital in Toronto opens next year, patients will be able to control room temperature, adjust lighting and video chat with a nurse, using a bedside monitor. Last year, Niagara Health System opened a hospital with the ability to split into 2 distinct air handling zones in the event of a pandemic.

This month, Windsor Regional Hospital is launching a project that allows residents to take a virtual tour of some of these state-of-the-art hospitals, by bringing the latest in healthcare infrastructure and innovation right to your computer screen.
