Windsor Regional Hospital Staff **Prepared For Ebola** 

A recent media conference outlined Windsor Regional Hospital's preparedness in the event of a patient suspected or showing symptoms of Ebola virus.

The team of Karen McCullough, Chief Operating Officer and Chief Nursing Executive; Dr. Paul Bradford, Director of Emergency/Trauma Medicine; Karen Riddell, Director, Professional Practice and Operations and Erika Vitale, Manager, Infection Prevention and Control spoke to planning underway that included a refresher course for staff on commonly used PPEs (Personal Protection Equipment) along with full-body protective suits. Screening has increased and both campuses have a designed area to guarantine an individual should they arrive in the ER with Ebola like symptoms. As Erika narrated. Karen Riddell demonstrated the appropriate manner of putting on and removing a PPE along with displaying a sample of the enhanced protective suit.

"The Ministry of Health and Long Term Care is working on the details of transportation and what special precautions will be required to manage the transfer of a suspected patient with Ebola to a designated hospital in Ontario," said Karen McCullough.

We have learned a lot since SARS on how to manage infectious disease and protecting patients, staff and the public. Over the last ten years, we have become more vigilant about hand hygiene and preventing infections among ourselves and patients.

Dr. Paul Bradford indicated the MOHLTC has already directed dispatchers to ask additional questions to prepare paramedics when they go on a call. He indicated that hand washing is also the public's best defense against Ebola and any transferable diseases.

# **Celebrating Our RT's**

This week, Windsor Regional Hospital salutes the more than 60 members of our health care team who provide professional care to patients with respiratory ailments and associated disorders.

Respiratory Therapists Week (October 26 to November 1) recognizes the vital role RTs play throughout a hospital – from car accident victims, to premature babies with immature lungs, to heart attack and stroke patients, to those with asthma and emphysema.

"We are there from cradle to grave, providing broad, continued care throughout the organization," said Rob Elliott, Senior Respiratory Therapist at the Ouellette campus.

RTs are found at the most critical situations. "The most premature babies, we are there. The person whose heart just stopped, we are there. The person whose breathing is so laborious, they are about to go into respiratory failure, we are there," said Ed Duda, an RT at Met campus.

# **Easy Baked Apples with Walnuts & Raisins**

Nothing says fall quite like the warm, spiced dessert of baked apples. Packed with fiber, particularly pectin fiber, apples help gut bacteria produce compounds to protect colon cells. Sprinkled with walnuts and raisins, this recipe also contains beneficial omega-3 fat and cancer-protective flavonoids and phenolic acids. Enjoy for dessert or top with yogurt and granola for a sweet, nutritious breakfast.



#### **INGREDIENTS**

Canola oil cooking spray
3 Tbsp. whole-wheat flour
3/4-1 tsp. ground cinnamon
1/4
1/3 cup coarsely chopped walnuts
1/3 cup apple cider

3 large apples (variety optional) 3 Tbsp. brown sugar 1/4-1/2 tsp. ground nutmeg 1/4 cup raisins

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Spray oven-proof glass pie dish. Cut apples in half from top to bottom, core and peel. Lay halves flat and cut into medium slices. Place apple slices in large bowl. In medium bowl, mix together flour, sugar, cinnamon and nutmeg. Sprinkle mixture on apples and gently stir until apples are evenly coated with spices. Gently fold in walnuts and raisins. Spoon apple mixture into prepared pie dish. Drizzle cider evenly over top. Bake 50-55 minutes or until apples are tender. Remove from oven and cool 5 minutes. Using spatula, carefully turn over apple mixture to get caramelized sauce from bottom of dish. Serve hot or let cool to room temperature, refrigerate and serve cold later.

#### Makes 6 servings.

**Per serving:** 151 calories, 3.5 g total fat (1 g saturated fat), 31 g carbohydrate, 2 g protein, 4 g dietary fiber, 5 mg sodium.

do your part to reduce the spread of infection



Windsor Regional Hospital believes that Infection Prevention and Control is vital to patient safety. ALL persons working at both campuses of the hospital must have a RESPONSIBILITY to practice good infection prevention and control.

The hospital has adopted the "Stop and Sanitize" campaign. Hand hygiene is the single most effective way to prevent health-care associated infections and the spread of antibiotic resistant organisms.

All staff, patients and visitors are asked to perform hand hygiene when entering/exiting the hospital. There are 2 methods for performing hand hygiene:

#### Alcohol-Based Hand Rub (ABHR)

PREFERRED when hands are not visibly soiled.
 Rub 1-2 pumps of ABHR into palms, fingers, wrists, etc. for 15 seconds (or until dry).

#### Hand Washing (Soap and Water)

Apply soap to wet hands and lather 15 seconds. Rinse thoroughly under warm running water. Dry with a paper towel and turn off tap (and open door) with a paper towel. Note: If hands are visibly soiled and there is no running water, use a moist towelette to remove visible soil and then ABHR.
