# **WRH Hospital Comments On Influenza**

To date, on patients have contracted influenza while at Windsor Regional Hospital. We can confirm that 30 influenza patients have been treated at WRH, however they arrived at the hospital with the virus.

On January 7, Hôtel-Dieu Grace Healthcare (HDGH) confirmed one case of the contagious virus and we are monitoring five other suspected infections.

At the time, David Musyj commented that WRH had not seen any confirmed influenza cases. This year, the flu season has had very little impact on the hospital and its two emergency departments. This is a contrast to last year, when the high numbers of influenza patients flooded the ERs and taxed hospital resources.

On January 8, the influenza alert at HDGH was upgraded to an outbreak because of the number of suspected flu cases. All were in the Emara complex continuing care facility.

Also, retirement residences and long term care homes were affected as well with the numbers growing. As a result, both HDGH and WRH began restricting visitors. Specifically, no children under the age of 14 will be allowed to visit WRH hospital patients.

With this increase, the risk of internal transmission had increased because of the large number of influenza patients coming in and the inability to discharge some patient to facilities in the community

To assist, WRH has requested the Erie St. Clair LHIN to open more beds. On January 9, 10 beds were opened having received verbal approval for funding.

As of January 15, 30 influenza confirmed patients have been treated at WRH. Many more with respiratory illness are being treated and waiting for results and HDGH continues to restrict visitors as it deals with the flu outbreak in three units.

"Our staff have done a great job at taking necessary precautions to limit the spread of influenza", said David Musyj, President and CEO.

# Vegetable Quinoa Salad

Preparation Time: 15 minutes Cooking Time: 10 to 20 minutes

Makes: Serves 10

#### INGREDIENTS:

- 500 mL/2 cups Cold water
- 2 Tomatoes, chopped
- 250 mL/1 cup Quinoa, well rinsed and drained
- 2 Large Sprigs Italian (flat-leaf) parsley (leaves only), chopped
- 1/4 English Cucumber, chopped
- 1/3 cup Chopped Red, Green, Yellow or mixed bell peppers

#### Vinaigrette

- 3 tbsp Extra-virgin olive oil
- 2 tbsp Freshly squeezed lemon juice
- 1 1/2 tsp Hot pepper flakes (optional) 1/2 tsp Salt
- 1/2 tsp Freshly ground black pepper
- 1/2 tsp Dried lavender flowers (optional)

#### **DIRECTIONS:**

In a medium saucepan, over medium heat, bring quinoa and water to a boil. Reduce heat and boil gently for 10 to 15 minutes or until the white germ separates from the seed. Cover, remove from heat and let stand for 5 minutes. Remove lid, let cool and fluff with a fork. Meanwhile, in a large bowl, combine tomatoes, parsley, cucumber and bell peppers. Stir in cooled quinoa. Prepare the vinaigrette: In a small bowl, whisk together olive oil, lemon juice, hot pepper flakes (if using), salt, pepper and lavender (if using). Pour vinaigrette over salad and toss to coat.

Optional: Add black beans or chickpeas to increase the protein and fibre content.

# Signs Of A Stroke Campaign

The Heart and Stroke Foundation has launched a new national campaign to help Canadians recoanize the signs of stroke and act FAST.

FAST is an easy and memorable way to remember the major signs of stroke. FAST stands for **F**ace – is it drooping? **A**rms – can you raise them? **S**peech - is it slurred or jumbled? And **T**ime – to call 9-1-1 right away.

Stroke is a medical emergency. Recognizing the signs of stroke and acting quickly can mean the difference between life and death, or the difference between a full recovery and lasting disability.

Stroke is the third leading cause of death in Canada and a leading cause of disability. There are an estimated 62,000 strokes in Canada each year. That is one stroke every 9 minutes. Not enough Canadians recognize the signs of stroke and know what to do. FAST is an approach that is being used by many countries around the world with positive outcomes. In French, FAST translates to **VITE**, which stands for **Vi**sage, Incapacité, **T**rouble de la parole and **E**xtrême urgence.

The Foundation is reaching out to Canadians with a national social media campaign, direct communication with our donors and stakeholders, and an educational TV spot that began airing in Ontario at the end of December, with the support of the Ministry of Health and Long Term Care.

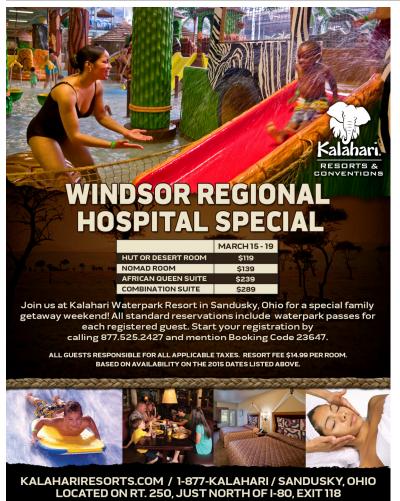
