Sweet Potato Bean Soup

If you're looking for a guick and easy way to eat well and stay healthy this year, add our savory bean soup to your recipe repertoire. Sweet potatoes, chickpeas and white beans mingle with cumin and basil for a simple soup that's packed with cancer-protective nutrients. Beans are rich in soluble and insoluble fiber, helping to stabilize blood sugar, promote intestinal health and lower your risk for colorectal cancer.

INGREDIENTS

- 2 cartons (32 oz.) low-sodium chicken broth
- (4 med) sweet potatoes, peeled, cut into pieces 1/2 tsp. paprika
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 3 stalks celery, sliced 1/4-inch thick
- 2 cans (15.5 oz.) (white kidney beans), rinsed
- 1 can (15.5 oz.) chickpeas, drained/rinsed
- 1/3 cup fresh basil or parsley, coarsely chopped
- 1/4 tsp. around cumin
- 1 can (6oz.) tomato paste
- Salt and Pepper to taste

In large pot over high heat, pour in broth and add sweet potatoes, onion, celery, tomato paste, paprika and cumin and bring to a boil. Add salt and pepper to taste. Reduce heat and simmer until vegetables are tender, about 20-25 minutes. Stir in beans and chickpeas. Cover and simmer until beans are heated through, about 3-4 minutes. Gently stir soup until well mixed and ladle into soup bowls. Garnish with basil or parsley and serve. For creamy soup, purée a portion of the soup, return to the pot and combine well before serving.

Makes 8 servings.

Per serving: 250 calories, 3.5 g total fat (<1 g saturated fat), 42 g carbohydrate, 15 a protein, 10 a dietary fiber, 480 mg sodium.
