

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### Construction Alert! Plan Ahead Before Coming To Ouellette Campus

As noted in a memo that was circulated last week, please be advised that the City of Windsor has contracted significant road repair work for Goyeau Street that is scheduled to commence the week starting this Monday, May 14th.

The work to repave the street from Erie St. to Giles Blvd. is expected to last 5-7 days (depending on the weather). This will result in a temporary disruption to normal access to the Ouellette campus from the Goyeau St. side. This work is required as part of local road infrastructure improvements and the goal is to have the work completed as quickly as possible while having a minimal impact on patients, visitors, employees, professional staff and volunteers.

We have worked with the City of Windsor to ensure ambulances have an accessible route to the Emergency Department, with the work being staged in a way that there will always be ambulance access to the ED.

We know, however, that this will create some congestion and frustration for patients and visitors coming to the Ouellette campus, as well as those coming to work.

We will be notifying the public through social media and mainstream media that the work is being conducted, and recommend they give themselves a little more time to get to the hospital than they would normally require. We are also asking the public to be patient with road workers stationed around the campus who will do their best to direct vehicles to where they can park. The same message goes for our employees, professional staff and volunteers: please plan additional time to get to work and anticipate some delays when you arrive at the campus. Also, where possible if you can park further offsite than normal, please do so.

For parking, please consider "Lot G" which is at the northeast corner of Erie and Goyeau Streets as an alternative to the two small lots (Lot "C" and Lot "D") on Goyeau Street that may see access closed over the course of the project. The "Viscount" lot will be available coming in through Dufferin Place (off Giles Blvd.) and the parking garage will always be accessible from the entrance to the garage off Erie St. Both of these lots will have the same number of spots as they usually do. Avoid Goyeau Street where possible.

Here are some other suggestions to make travelling to the hospital a little easier and less congested during the repair work:

- We are asking all employees/volunteers/professional staff to consider car-pooling and using public transit where possible.
- If you are a director/manager of personnel (non-clinical) and normally work at an Ouellette office but can work from home during the construction, please consider options that would allow yourself and/or your employees to work from home, where possible.
- Where possible, if you have scheduled a meeting with outside stakeholders at the Ouellette campus during the identified days, please consider postponing these gatherings for a future week.

We will advise as soon as the road work is completed and/or if there are delays in completion.

## Ava's Birthday Wish



#### MAY 2018 SAFETY THEME EMERGENCY EYEWASH EQUIPMENT

The first 10-15 seconds after an exposure to a hazardous substance can be critical; delaying treatment, even for a few seconds can cause serious injury. Emergency eyewash stations provide instant decontamination and allows affected workers to flush away hazardous substances to minimize or eliminate the risk of injury. Please refer to instructional poster for directions to familiarize yourself with the equipment.



#### Instructions for Use of Emergency Eyewash Equipment:

- 1. Remove any contact lenses immediately if a chemical or other substance gets into the eye. The contact can hold the substance to the eye, causing severe damage.
- Forcibly hold your eyes open and place them at the designated spot on the eyewash station; while this may be difficult, it is important to ensure proper flushing occurs.
- Continue to hold your eyes open and if possible have someone else turn the water on; stations are designed to deliver continuous flushing under gentle pressure to ensure that the substance is flushed from your eye.
- 4. Continue to irrigate your eyes for at least 15 minutes and seek medical assistance.

#### Helpful Tips:

- Wearing proper PPE will significantly reduce the chances of getting something in your eye(s).
- Even if the substance is only in one eye, always flush both eyes to ensure that both eyes are free
  of the substance. If you get something in your eye DO NOT RUB IT as rubbing the eye will create
  irritation and may lead to more damage.

# **#RECIPEOFTHEWEEK**

### Homemade Tilapia Fish Tacos

Makes 6 servings / Preparation: 10 min Cooking Time: 25

#### INGREDIENTS

- 1/2 cup panko bread crumbs
- 1/2 tsp. chili powder
- 1/4 tsp. onion powder
- 1/4 tsp. garlic powder
- 1/4 tsp. ground cumin
- 1 cup KRAFT Mexican Style Finely Shredded Four Cheese
- 6 tilapia fillets (1-1/2 lb.)
- 2 cups shredded purple cabbage
- 1/2 cup pineapple salsa
- 12 corn tortillas (6 inch), warmed

#### DIRECTIONS

Heat oven to 375°F. Combine bread crumbs and seasonings; stir in cheese. Moisten fish with water; coat with cheese mixture, lightly pressing cheese mixture onto both sides of fish. Place on baking sheet sprayed with cooking spray; top with any remaining cheese mixture. Bake 12 to 15 min. or until fish flakes easily with fork. Meanwhile, combine cabbage and salsa. Cut fish in half; place on tortillas. Top with cabbage mixture. Fold in half.
