Windsor-Essex is taking on the challenge of making sure every child in our region has an opportunity for success through a new community initiative that WRH is proud to be part of.

ProsperUs is a "Cradle to Career" vision to give children in Windsor-Essex the opportunities they need to succeed and unlock their potential. "Cradle to Career" encompasses supporting children from before they are born through pre-natal health for moms all the way through to landing their first job as a young adult.

Support and contributions to ProsperUs comes from a collective of local non-profit, government, health care, education, labour, business, and inspired residents. The 30-plus organizations that are part of the ProsperUs collaborative to date are all pooling new money, time and talent, demonstrating that this is more than a traditional collaboration. Many of them expressed their 'all in' support at the media event, including the city's mayor, the county's warden, leaders from local school boards, hospitals, business, labour, and the social services sector. The collaborative will collect and share data and measure shared targets that will drive at improving outcomes for vulnerable children and youth.

From a WRH perspective, "being there from the cradle and even before then, WRH will partner to provide support that children in our community desperately need and deserve to have a clear path to economic prosperity through family, education and community support and opportunity," said President and CEO David Musyj.

First Physician To Champion Nephrology

Windsor physician, Dr. Richard Johnson, who recently passed away, was the first doctor in Canada to establish a Chronic Renal Dialysis Program at the former Salvation Army Grace Hospital in Windsor. The year was 1964 when, Dr. Johnson treated the first patient with Acute Dialysis at the Grace site.

Dr. Johnson attended Patterson Collegiate High School in Windsor before going to Queens University for Medicine, graduating in 1955. He returned to Windsor, completing his internship and residency through Wayne State University while working at the Detroit Receiving and Detroit City Hospitals. His practice in Internal Medicine and Nephrology opened in Windsor in 1960. At the time when Windsor had four hospitals (Metropolitan General, Windsor Western Hospital Centre; Hôtel Dieu Hospital of St. Joseph and the Salvation Army Grace Hospital), Dr. Johnson had active privileges at all four of them, serving as Chief of Medicine and Chief of Staff at the Grace Hospital until 1992.

He was Past President of Essex County Medical Society and Life Member of the Ontario Medical Association, along with serving on several Committees.

Dr. Johnson will be remembered as a dedicated doctor within the professional staff roster who cared deeply for his patients and his profession.

On a personal note, Dr. Johnson was an avid boater, serving as the Past Commodore of the Windsor Yacht Club. He and his wife, June spent many cruises on his boat, Camelot.

The Windsor Regional Hospital Foundation is pleased that the family selected the Renal Dialysis Program, now based in the Bell Building and Jeanne Mance Building, as the beneficiary of memorial donations in memory of Dr. Richard Johnson, its founder.

#RECIPEOFTHEWEEK

- Nonstick cooking spray

- 1 cup all-purpose flour

- ½ cup packed brown sugar

- 1 tsp baking powder

- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Apple-Pecan Upside-Down Cake

Makes 12 servings / Prep: 20 min / Cooking: 25-30 min

INGREDIENTS

- 1/4 cup butter
- 2 eggs
- 2 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1/4 tsp salt
- ¼ cup granulated sugar
- ½ cup coarsely ground toasted pecans
- 1/2 teaspoon finely shredded lemon peel
- 3 cups thinly sliced apples (such as Golden Delicious)
- 12 thin apple slices (optional)
- Frozen light whipped dessert topping, thawed (optional)

DIRECTIONS

Let butter and egg product stand at room temperature for 30 minutes. Meanwhile, line a 9x9-inch baking pan with foil. Coat foil with nonstick cooking spray; set aside. In a small bowl, stir together flour, cinnamon, baking powder, and salt; set aside. Preheat oven to 350°F. In a medium bowl, beat butter with an electric mixer on medium to high speed for 30 seconds. Add brown sugar and granulated sugar, beating on medium speed until combined and scraping bowl as needed (see Tip). Beat on medium speed for 2 minutes more. Beat in egg and vanilla. Add flour mixture; beat until combined. Stir in pecans and lemon peel. Arrange the 3 cups apples in prepared pan; spoon pecan mixture over apples and spread evenly (batter will be thick and may not cover all the apple pieces). Bake 25 to 30 minutes or until a toothpick inserted near the center comes out clean. Cool in pan on a wire rack for 5 minutes. Invert onto a serving platter; carefully remove foil. Serve warm. If using the thin apple slices, cook 12 apple slices in a small amount of boiling water about 1 minute or just until tender; drain well and pat dry with paper towels. If desired, top individual servings of cake with the cooked thin apple slices and/or light whipped dessert topping.
