Happy Thanksgiving 2018!

Monday, October 8, 2018 is a statuary holiday in Canada celebrating Happy Thanksgiving across the country. The concept of Thanksgiving goes back long before Europeans settled in North America. Europeans celebrated festivals of thanks and celebrations of harvest through Europe during the month of October.

The Thanksgiving holiday tradition in Canada dates back to when the English explorer, Martin Frobisher, came upon the land we now know as Canada while searching for a Northern passage to the Orient. When Frobisher settled in Canada, he held a formal ceremony where he gave thanks for surviving the long journey. Thanksgiving became a nationally recognized holiday in Canada in 1879.

Today, it is celebrated by gathering with loved ones and preparing the Thanksgiving Day meal, which usually includes turkey, mashed potatoes, stuffing, cranberry sauce and many other dishes. And don't forget pumpkin pie with whipped cream topping!

In the United States, the holiday feast dates back to November, 1621, when the newly arrived Pilgrims and the Wampanoag nation gathered at Plymouth, Massachusetts for an autumn harvest celebration, an event regarded as America's "first Thanksgiving". In 1789, President George Washington requested the U.S. Congress to declare Thanksgiving a public holiday during the harvest season, selecting the fourth Thursday of November each year. Again, a day when families and friends gather to give thanks and celebrate with dinner, parades and NFL football games!

#RECIPEOFTHEWEEK

Sweet Potato-Peanut Bisque

Makes 5 servings Preparation/Cooking: 30 min

INGREDIENTS

- 2 sweet potatoes (10-12 ounces each)
- 1 tablespoon canola oil
- 1 small yellow onion, chopped
- 1 large clove garlic, minced
- 3 cups low sodium tomato-vegetable juice or tomato juice
- 1 (4-ounce) can diced green chiles, preferably hot, drained
- 2 teaspoons minced fresh ginger
- 1 teaspoon ground allspice
- 1 (15-ounce) can vegetable broth
- 1/2 cup smooth natural peanut butter
- Freshly ground pepper to taste
- Chopped fresh cilantro leaves for garnish

DIRECTIONS

Prick sweet potatoes in several places with a fork. Microwave on High until just cooked through, 7 to 10 minutes. Set aside to cool. Meanwhile, heat oil in a large saucepan or Dutch oven over medium-high heat. Add onion and cook, stirring, until it just begins to brown, 2 to 4 minutes. Add garlic and cook, stirring, for 1 minute more. Stir in juice, green chiles, ginger and allspice. Adjust the heat so the mixture boils gently; cook for 10 minutes. Meanwhile, peel the sweet potatoes and chop into bite-size pieces. Add half to the pot. Place the other half in a food processor or blender along with broth and peanut butter. Puree until completely smooth. Add the puree to the pot and stir well to combine. Thin the bisque with water, if desired. Season with pepper. Heat until hot. Garnish with cilantro, if desired.
