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# Family Birthing Centre Celebrates EPIQ Success!

The Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) at Windsor Regional Hospital has attained great strides since joining EPIQ (Evidenced-based Practice for Improving Quality) over a year ago. WRH's NICU is part of 25 NICU's across the country participating in the process.

The focus was to work on infection in the NICU as the ranking was poorer with comparators. The goal was to achieve zero (0) infections! To date, the NICU is aligned with that goal. The highest number of days with a blood stream infection was 332 and the highest number of days without was 261.

"I worked closely with Tammy Warkentin, NP and the EPIQ Chair to continue to keep the momentum going within the department," stated Josie Piazza, Clinical Practice Coordinator for "We introduced multiple practice changes, developed policy changes and collaborated with other existing committees to support complementary projects such as Oral Immune Therapy within 6 hours of birth in the Family Birthing Centre. We also facilitated site visits to other NICU's to seek new information and ideas to help achieve the success we have seen in a relatively short time."

EPIQ is a national network of clinicians, front-line workers and researchers, collaborating cumulative experiences and expertise of all participants to encourage evidence-based practice for improving quality.

The goals of EIPQ are:

- To evaluate practice in relation to the outcomes of morbidities in the NICU including Necrotizing Enterocolitis (NEC), Bronchopulmonary Dysplasia (BPD), Nosocomial Infection (NI), Intraventricular Hemorrhage (VH) and Retinopathy of Prematurity (ROP).
- To promote education and awareness of quality improvement within frontline staff;
- To evaluate, identify and lead practice changes through PDSA (Planning, Doing, Studying and Acting) cycles; and
- Endure the NICU is in alignment with evidence-based practice as recommended by the ERIQ bundles of care.

Congratulations to all frontline and management staff for their work and striving toward the ultimate goal through EPIQ!

# P.A.R.T.Y. Program 2018-2019

P.A.R.T.Y. Program or Prevent Alcohol and Risk-Related Trauma in youth is a program offered through Windsor Regional Hospital's Regional Trauma Program and Injury Prevention that takes students on the journey of a trauma patient. We discuss risks, coping mechanisms, and consequences of participating in high-risk behaviours. The students have an opportunity to role-play and tour our level II trauma centre, taking the journey that a trauma patient would go through. They have the opportunity to meet various health care practitioners and end their experience meeting injury survivors. Our hospital has been running this unique program for over twenty years now and aims to give students the skills to help prevent injury, particularly around road safety.

This year marks a unique time in the lives of safety and Canadians. P.A.R.T.Y. Program Windsor has completed our first year of evaluating participant's behaviours and beliefs around drug use, including alcohol and other drugs. On the eve of our country's new cannabis legislation, and with a marked increase in THC positive testing from our region's trauma patients, we look forward to analyzing and comparing pre and post legalization survey results.

Friday, October 12 marked the beginning of our latest season. Students of E.J. Lajeunesse were our first participants this year and experienced, first hand, what it potentially means to be one of our WRH trauma patients. They learned the potential life threatening and life changing consequences of high-risk behaviours while touring our hospital and meeting the host of volunteers and staff that make this program possible, saving the lives of the youth of Windsor and Essex County, together.

# Powering It Up On Behalf of **Renal Patients**

The EDA (Electricity Distributors Association) Western District, along with Enwin Utilities, and several sponsors, made a significant donation of \$33,500 to Windsor Regional Hospital's Renal Dialysis Program, and an additional \$33,350 to Ronald McDonald House Windsor. They raised the funds from their annual golf tournament held on September 25 at Ambassador Golf Club.

"The EDA Western District has a long commitment of supporting local Southwestern Ontario communities, having donated close to \$290,000 over the last six years," stated Ray Tracey, President and CEO, Essex Power and Chair, EDA Western District.

Monica Staley Liang, Vice President, Regional Cancer Services, Renal Dialysis, Patient Relations and Legal Affairs said that renal chairs are vital in the daily care of patients affected by chronic kidney disease. They provide comfort during long hours of dialysis required for each patient.

"We are pleased to be able to donate this year's proceeds to the two very worthy organizations that provide health care and support to many," said Helga Reidel, President and CEO, Enwin Utilities Ltd.

The WRH Nephrology-Renal Dialysis Program has grown 43% over the last five years, now housed in the Bell Building on Goyeau Street, adjacent to the Ouellette Campus. Over 43,000 hemodialysis patients have received treatment from the 30 new stations; in addition to the 10 in the Jeanne Mance Building, 7 at Leamington's Erie Shores Healthcare and 4 inpatient stations.

# Skillet Gnocchi with Chard & White Beans

Makes 6 servings / Preparation/Cooking: 30 min

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 1 teaspoon extra-virgin olive oil, divided
- 1 16-ounce package shelf-stable gnocchi
- 1 medium yellow onion, thinly sliced
- 4 cloves garlic, minced
- ½ cup water
- 6 cups chopped chard or spinach leaves
- 1 (15-ounce) can diced tomatoes with Italian seasonings
- 1 (15-ounce) can white beans, rinsed
- 1/4 teaspoon freshly ground pepper
- ½ cup shredded part-skim mozzarella cheese
- 1/4 cup finely shredded Parmesan cheese

### **DIRECTIONS**

Heat 1 tablespoon oil in a large nonstick skillet over medium heat. Add gnocchi and cook, stirring often, until plumped and starting to brown, 5 to 7 minutes. Transfer to a bowl. Add the remaining 1 teaspoon oil and onion to the pan and cook, stirring, over medium heat, for 2 minutes. Stir in garlic and water. Cover and cook until the onion is soft, 4 to 6 minutes. Add chard (or spinach) and cook, stirring, until starting to wilt, 1 to 2 minutes. Stir in tomatoes, beans and pepper and bring to a simmer. Stir in the gnocchi and sprinkle with mozzarella and Parmesan. Cover and cook until the cheese is melted and the sauce is bubbling, about 3 minutes.
