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MRT (Medical Radiation Technologists) Week At WRH

WRH is celebrating Medical Radiation Technologist Week and recognizing the professionals who provide an essential link between advanced technology and patient care.

Medical Radiation Technologists, across Canada and at Windsor Regional Hospital celebrate their work during this special week. These nationally certified technologists and therapists are committed to delivering compassionate care to patients, while delivering critical high-tech services to professional staff and other healthcare professionals. MRTs deliver essential care through the use of technology in hospitals and clinics from coast to coast, and also on the battlefields wherever our Canadian Forces are deployed. They can also be found in dressing rooms of professional sport teams.

Sponsored by the Canadian Association of Medical Radiation Technologists and its provincial partners, MRT Week shines a spotlight on this dynamic area of healthcare to increase awareness and understanding of the contributions of the professionals involved in the clinical applications of medical radiation technology.

The Canadian Association of Medical Radiation Technologists (CAMRT) is the national professional association and certifying body for radiological, nuclear medicine and magnetic resonance imaging technologists and radiation therapists. Recognized at home and internationally as a leading advocate for the profession of medical radiation technology, the CAMRT is an authoritative voice on the critical issues that affect its members and their practice. Established in 1942, the CAMRT today represents over 12,000 members.

The MRT profession today includes a diverse array of highly-trained professionals representing various disciplines in medical imaging and radiation therapy.

Magnetic Resonance Technologists – produce diagnostic images with equipment that generates radio-waves and a strong magnetic field. Extensive knowledge of anatomy, pathology and physiology allows MRI technologists to obtain images, monitor and care for patients during scans.

Nuclear Medicine Technologists – have technical expertise in the use of radiopharmaceuticals and radiation physics, allowing them to perform diagnostic imaging procedures with sophisticated technology. Their use of exceptional quality assurance techniques provides for patient safety and comfort.

Radiation Therapists – are responsible for planning and administering radiation treatment for cancer patients. Therapists offer ongoing care and support to patients and their families during the course of treatment.

Radiological Technologists – produce images of body parts and systems by performing exams in general x-ray, CT, breast imaging and operating room procedures. They are expert in the operation of complex medical radiation equipment, while providing comprehensive, compassionate care to each patient.

Nurse Practitioner Week 2018

The role of the nurse practitioner (NP) will be showcased November 11-17, 2018, as NPs across the country celebrate their practice during National Nurse Practitioner Week. In Canada, this distinguished group of health care professionals number close to 5000 strong with an additional number of NP students graduating each year.

Events held in communities around the country will acquaint local citizens with the role of NPs as providers of high-quality, cost-effective, personalized health care and will highlight the value of NPs as care providers. NP practice offers a unique combination of nursing and health care service to patients. Focusing not only on diagnosing and managing acute and chronic illnesses, NPs integrate health promotion, disease prevention, counselling and patient education to help patients understand their complete health picture.

In a population that is aging, with baby boomers becoming seniors in growing numbers over the next ten years, having access to health care professionals such as NPs who offer personalized health care based on medical and advanced nursing knowledge will become even more important.

Windsor Regional Hospital implemented the NP role almost 20 years ago and now has over 30 NPs who are integrated within teams. At WRH, NPs provide service to patients and teams in both ERs, both ICUs, Respirology, Cardiology/CCU, Neurosurgery, Trauma/ General Surgery, Unattached Patient Program (Hospitalist), Pain Management, Oncology, NICU and the NP-Led Outreach to Long Term Care. In-patient NPs work with patient care teams to ensure that patients are making progress toward their goals. NPs improve flow by ordering needed tests, medications and/or treatments as the patient's situation evolves and saves time wasted in waiting for the physician to call back. NPs help to improve patient and family experience by communicating the patient's present condition, plan of care

and discharge plan. Discharge is expedited by NPs making referrals to appropriate community resources, writing discharge prescriptions and dictating the discharge summary to ensure continuity of the plan with the patient's community physicians.

#RECIPEOFTHEWEEK

Egg & Cottage Cheese Breakfast Bowl

Makes 1 servings Preparation: 10 min Cooking: 10 min

INGREDIENTS

- 1/2 cup (125 mL) cottage cheese
- 1 hard or soft-cooked egg (fried works too!)
- Half ripe avocado, pitted, peeled and sliced
- 2 mini radishes, sliced
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) cucumber, sliced
- 1 tbsp (15 mL) each finely chopped chives and green onion
- Pinch each salt and pepper

DIRECTIONS

Place cottage cheese in the bottom of bowl or to-go container. Place egg, avocado, radish, and cucumber on top.

Garnish with herbs, salt, and pepper. Make your eggs the night before to cut down on preparation time. Hard-cooked eggs can be kept in the fridge for up to a week. Include additional toppings such as tomatoes or wilted greens. If desired, substitute fried or poached eggs for hard or soft-cooked eggs.

Stroke Care Info Highlighted At International Conference

WRH efforts to improve the conversation about how our community cares for stroke patients were on electronic display at the World Stroke Congress in Montreal on October 17-20, 2018.

The two posters were about (1) community stroke navigation, and different approaches to it across Ontario and (2) how stroke community navigators are using Canadian best practice guidelines to improve patient outcomes.



A Stroke Community Navigator (SCN), such as Rachel Allchurch, Stroke Community Navigator for the Windsor Essex District Stroke Centre, (pictured above) is a health care professional that provides support for stroke survivors and their family to positively enhance the transitions across the continuum of care.

These services provided by the SCNs vary across Ontario, depending on the specific needs of those in the region.

Trained and professional SCNs provide holistic care and guidance, which helps to improve the stroke recovery experience and improve the client's quality of life. SCNs are able to ease the adjustment to post-stroke life through education, improved access to health care services and connections to appropriate care providers.
