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WRH Highlights Patient Care, Patient Experience **Programs at Prestigious Mayo Clinic**

Some of the many incredible Windsor Regional Hospital programs dedicated to providing quality care and an outstanding patient experience were on display for health care professionals across North America at a conference hosted by the prestigious Mayo Clinic last week.

Five programs were selected as poster presentations to be highlighted at the Mayo Clinic Delivery Science Summit, which was held September 16-18, 2015, at the Mayo Civic Center in Rochester, Minnesota.

Selected among hundreds of applicants, the poster presentations by WRH involved:

- · 'From Boardroom to Bedside: Engaging the Entire Organization in Patient Safety & Quality' which is about efforts to ensure knowledge about WRH's 14 corporate quality indicators was effectively communicated to those who provide care at the bedside.
- · 'Lean On Me: Practical Strategies for Improving Patient Satisfaction Through Improved Emotional Support' which focuses on WRH's efforts to provide emotional support to patients, including a number of programs for patients designed and developed by the Patient Experience Task Force.
- · 'Right Place, Right Time, Right Care: Short Stay Medical Unit Improves Patient Flow' which is about efforts to improve the transition of patients from the Emergency Department to in-patient beds so that patients requiring a bed aren't left waiting in the ED.
- · 'Concierge Program: Improving Patient Satisfaction Through Enhanced Interaction' which is about offering a variety of services to patients and family members while waiting for treatment or during their hospital stay.
- 'WellCome Mat Program: Strategies for Helping Patients Feel WellCome' which is about improving the emotional support we provide to our patients through a unique hospital orientation program that is provided to newly admitted patients on medical units.

"We are proud that our programs to improve the quality of care we provide and the patient experience they need are being recognized and shared with leaders throughout the continent," said David Musyj, WRH President and CEO. "The programs are a true reflection of our continuing vision to provide Outstanding Care - No Exceptions!"

In 2012, WRH was informed it was the first Canadian hospital to make clinical quality of care presentations at an international conference held at the Mayo Clinic, a non-profit world leader in medical care, research and education.

The conference was attended by hundreds of health care and related professionals, including clinicians, scientists, administrative leaders, policymakers and IT professionals. The conference focused on ways to enhance the patient experience, improve health outcomes and manage the cost of care.

Cardiac Cath Lab Now Open 24/7

An innovative procedure that provides life-saving treatment for cardiac patients at Windsor Regional Hospital is now available 24 hours a day, seven days a week - 24/7 - meaning more patients will receive this treatment in our community instead of having to be transported across the border.

Annually, some 750 Percutaneous Coronary Intervention (PCI) procedures are conducted locally, including 650 scheduled procedures for patients with an acute ST-elevation myocardial infarction as a preventative treatment, as well as 100 emergency angioplasties, which were first performed in Windsor at the Ouellette campus. Non-emergency procedures began in the cath lab in the spring of 2007, with emergency patients able to receive the procedure three days a week a year later. By 2011, the lab was open every weekday but only from 7 am to 7 pm Monday to Friday, resulting in hundreds of patients every year sent out of town (mostly to Detroit) for this procedure after hours and on weekends.

The program expanded last year to "24/5," but still left patients requiring the procedure needing to be transported elsewhere on weekends. The second phase of this expansion will now allow 24/7 access to this life-saving procedure beginning Saturday, September 26.

WRH CEO David Musyj said the funding announcement last summer "paved the way" for a 24/7 angioplasty program with a vision to become a regional cardiac program and also improves service offerings as we continue to move forward towards a new state-of-the-art acute care hospital.

The funding also confirmed capital to provide a new 24 hour two-table cardiac catheterization lab – or cath lab. The project will also involve renovating about 20,000 square feet of existing hospital space, locating the new cath lab on the 5th floor and relocating the day surgery program to the 2nd floor at the Ouellette Campus.

Sweet Chili Tofu Stir Fry

Makes 4 Servings / Preparation: 15 min / Cooking Time: 12 min

INGREDIENTS

- Vegetable cooking spray
- Sliced Spanish onion (3/4 cup)
- Baby carrots, cut into pieces (1 cup) Sugar snap peas, trim (3/4 cup)
- Sweet chili sauce (1/4 cup)
- Chopped fresh cilantro (1 tsp)
- Firm tofu, cut into thin strips (50z)
- Broccoli florets (1 cup)
- Julienned red bell pepper (1/2 cup) Vegetable broth/water (1/2 cup)
 - Grated orange zest (1 tsp)

METHOD

Heat a wok or large skillet over medium-high heat. Spray with vegetable cooking spray. Brown tofu on both sides, then remove from pan and set aside. Add onion to wok and sauté for 1 minute. Add broccoli, carrots, peas and red pepper; stir-fry until tender-crisp, about 5 minutes. Return tofu to wok and stir in broth, chili sauce and orange zest. Heat until bubbling. Transfer stir-fry to serving platter and sprinkle with cilantro, if using.

Near Miss: an event or situation that could have resulted in an accident, injury or illness to a patient but did not, either by chance or through timely intervention.
