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Windsor Regional Hospital Prepares For Legislated 100% Smoke-Free On Hospital Property

Windsor Regional Hospital and the Windsor-Essex Health Unit have collaborated to inform staff, patients, families and the community coming to Windsor Regional Hospital that as of January 1, 2018, no one is allowed smoke on hospital property grounds.

Provincial legislation comes into effect on January 1, 2018 and will prohibit smoking cigarettes, e-cigarettes, medical marijuana or any other tobacco product on hospital property!

Currently, the Smoke-free Ontario Act allows for one designated smoking area for every hospital in Ontario. These locations will be removed effective the New Year at both the Met Campus and Ouellette Campus.

The Windsor Essex Health Unit Tobacco Enforcement Officers Unit, which gives their enforcement officers reasonable grounds to lay charges, have been proactively inspecting hospitals and have worked with WRH Security since regulations were first introduced in 2016. Violators are subject to a fine of \$305 for a first offence. "We feel we have made great progress in protecting the health of WRH patients, staff, guests and volunteers and look forward to our successful partnerships with staff and security in the New Year." stated Eric Nadalin, Manager of Chronic Disease and Injury Prevention for the Health Unit.

"We want to remind the community about what the legislation dictates and also to be mindful and courteous of those around them," said David Musyj, President and CEO. "It is challenging for security to have to enforce smoking restrictions constantly around our campuses. Whether you are staff, a patient or visitor; if you choose to smoke, please do so in the designated areas, remembering that as of January 1st, you will not be allowed to smoke anywhere on our hospital property."

In additional, Ed Duda, Clinical Practice Manager, Respiratory Therapy, helps patients who want to stop smoking, offering nicotine replacement therapy products to patients who are struggling to quit smoking. WRH also offers smoking cessation programs. The Windsor Essex Health Unit also has several educational programs to help those who want to quit the habit of smoking.

At a recent media event. recognition was given to Ved Uppal, Coordinator of Team Clean. Ved was a patient and saw the need for improving the outdoor environment of each hospital site, including that of unsightly cigarette butts. The Team Clean volunteers began cleaning up both campuses last summer and have continued this season with great success.

With the total smoke free legislation in place on January1, it is anticipated some smokers will venture off to private property and those individuals are reminded to be respectful of residents who live around both campuses.

Coming Soon To WRH: A New Mobile-Friendly Recovery Guide For Patients And Families!


This summer, members of the SOP QBP Program have been working on a new tool to make the recovery process a little easier for patients and loved ones. The WRH Patient Journey App provides helpful information about a patient's medical condition, a daily guide to what they can expect while in the hospital and tips to prepare them for next steps after discharge.

Once patients install the app from the App Store, they will simply choose their diagnosis and the date of admission. When they press start, a personal timeline will be created and they will receive notifications with tips that will help them remain active role in their recovery.

A soft launch/pilot is planned for early September for patients with Ischemic Stroke. If all goes well, the app will be available later this fall in the Apple App Store and Google Play store for patients who are admitted with COPD, Community Acquired Pneumonia, CHF, and Hip fracture, with more diagnoses to follow.

The App is another tool being used as part of the QBP Patient Pathway Improvement Bundles that were launched in August. These bundles include information for clinical staff, physicians, patients and family members to ensure everyone is on the same page with clear expectations of care. The goal is to keep patients better informed about what to expect during their hospital stay and properly prepare them for discharge.

"QBP is helping to standardize the care patients receive across the organization," said Sharra Hodgins, Operations Manager of the Cath Lab. "It allows structure and some predictability to the care patients are receiving, all while keeping the patients more informed and involved in their care."

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Picnic Bento Lunch

Makes 1 servings Preparation: 30 min Cook Time: 30 min

INGREDIENTS

- 3 peach slices, halved
- 6 pearl-size mozzarella balls
- 2 thin slices prosciutto, cut into 6 pieces
- $-\frac{1}{2}$ cup cooked cheese tortellini (see Tip) - 2 tbsp corn
- 2 tbsp. diced carrot
- 1 tbsp chopped fresh basil
- 1 tsp extra-virgin olive oil
- 1 cup cherries
- 1 tsp grated Parmesan cheese - 3-5 mini bell peppers

- 1 tbsp white balsamic vinegar

- 1 tablespoon sunflower seeds

DIRECTIONS:

On each of three 4-inch skewers, alternate a peach slice, mozzarella ball and prosciutto slice, then repeat. Pack the skewers in a medium container. Toss tortellini, carrot, corn, basil, vinegar, oil and Parmesan together in a medium bowl. Pack in a medium container. Pack cherries, bell peppers and sunflower seeds in small-to-medium containers.
