People do not catch them through casual contact or by breathing the air.

WRH Celebrates Childhood Cancer Awareness Month

September is Childhood Cancer Awareness Month and Windsor Regional Hospital's Oncology POGO Clinic will host an information booth in the Met Campus first floor vendor lobby on three consecutive Tuesdays, (September 12, 19 and 26th).

A key focus this year is the 'Beads of Courage' program that provides children, undergoing difficult medical experiences an opportunity to earn a bead for each accomplishment achieved. You can purchase a 'Carry-A-Bead' kit for \$10. The idea is to provide a child with a bead along with an written inspirational message from you to encourage and give them uplifting hope. You keep the other bead as a reminder that you are thinking of the child through their daily struggles.

The Paediatric Oncology Group of Ontario (POGO) indicates that in Ontario, over 400 children are diagnosed with cancer every year and up to 4,000 children are receiving cancer treatment or follow-up care. Although cure rates are greater than 80%, approximately 60% of childhood cancer survivors face late effects such as neurocognitive impairments, fertility issues, and secondary cancers as a result of their disease and/or treatment.

Locally in the WRH Paediatric Oncology POGO Clinic, 55 patients were cared for and 738 clinic visits were recorded for 2016. This current fiscal year (2017), 60 patients have been treated and 929 clinic visits recorded.

"Those of us who have the privilege to work with children and their families challenged with a diagnosis of cancer always look upon this month as a time to remember those we have had the pleasure to serve at the Paediatric Oncology POGO Clinic," stated Dr. Leena Morgan, M.D., FRCPC, Chief of Paediatrics, WRH. "All of these children and families remind us of how fragile life can be however, they also show us how resilient, tough and determined they can be!

Be sure to visit the Childhood Cancer Awareness Booth every Tuesday in September during the month of September from 12:00 noon to 3:00 pm where, Child Life Services staff will answer questions and demonstrate how they work with young patients through reducing anxiety and stress through procedures.

Corvette Club Of Windsor Continue To Drive Toward Success!

An annual event is the Corvette Club of Windsor Display and Show at Dieppe Park each summer in June that attracts car buffs from as far away as Montreal, Ohio and Michigan. 

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Vegan Budda Bowl

Makes 4 servings Preparation: 30 min Cook Time: 30 min

INGREDIENTS

- 1 medium sweet potato, 1-inch chunks
- 3 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil
- 1/2 teaspoon salt, divided
- 1/2 teaspoon ground pepper, divided
- 2 tablespoons tahini
 - s tahini 2 tablespoons water lemon juice - 2 cups cooked quinoa
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice1 15-ounce can chickpeas
- 1 firm ripe avocado, diced
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh cilantro or parsley

DIRECTIONS

Preheat oven to 425°F. Toss sweet potato with 1 tablespoon oil and ¼ teaspoon each salt and pepper in a medium bowl. Transfer to a rimmed baking sheet. Roast, stirring once, until tender, 15 to 18 minutes. Meanwhile, whisk the remaining 2 tablespoons oil, tahini, water, lemon juice, garlic and the remaining ¼ teaspoon each salt and pepper in a small bowl. To serve, divide quinoa among 4 bowls. Top with equal amounts of sweet potato, chickpeas and avocado. Drizzle with the tahini sauce. Sprinkle with parsley (or cilantro)...
