## **CCOT Now Physician Led at both WRH Campuses**

CCOT has always been Physician Led at the Ouellette Campus with some very positive benefits for our patients. As a result of some advocacy work and in an attempt to standardize across both campuses Physician Led CCOT is now also starting at the Met Campus.

The purpose of the Critical Care Outreach Team (CCOT) is to provide rapid clinical support and early interventions by a specially trained team consisting of a Critical Care Trained Physician and Critical Care nurses who have specialized CCOT training. CCOT is for adult patients on any unit who show physiological signs of deterioration. Note that CCOT does not replace the Code Blue response.

CCOT's role is to apply the principles of acute medicine and resuscitation across the hospital and bring specialized knowledge and skills from the ICU directly to the bedside on a 24/7 basis. The CCOT Team works collaboratively with unit staff to identify, access and respond to the needs of at-risk patients prior to the development and progressive and irreversible deterioration.

Consider calling the CCOT Team if there is an acute change in:

Airway Threatened / stridor / excessive secretions

**Breathing**Respiratory <8 or >25 / distressed breathing / saturations <90% or Fi02 >60% **Circulation**Systolic blood pressure <90mmHa or >200 mmHa or decrease >40 mmHa /

heart rate <40 or >130

**Disability/** Decreased level of consciousness / new onset seizure or seizure lasting >5 minutes **Neurology** 

Other Urine O/P <100 ml in 4 hours / serious concerns about the patient

## **BUTT OUT BY JAN. 1**

Ahead of provincial legislation taking effect January 1st which will COMPLETELY ban smoking of cigarettes, e-cigarettes, medical marijuana any other tobacco product on hospital property, we are continuing our efforts to encourage and educate staff who smoke to kick the habit!

There are many local resources that can assist, including many from the local Windsor and Essex County Health Unit. Go to www.wechu.org/your-health/tobacco and click on "Ways to Quit Smoking" and you will find group and one-on-one counselling options, telephone and online links and much more.

Thank you to staff member Colleen Mahoney for emailing us to encourage those who want to quit to consider the Health Unit's STOP program. They run group education sessions as well as offering free nicotine patches at program workshops. You can get your name on a list for a call back from the Health Unit's Tobacco Cessation team members for future sessions at www.wechu.org/stop-smokinggood-registration-waitlist.

Also, if you have successfully quit, or know someone who has, tell us how you or your friend quit in 100-200 words and we will enter you in a contest for a \$100 gift card! Here's a good example written by Audrey Logan, WRH's Aboriginal Patient Navigator, who notes that the "purpose of traditional tobacco is to send prayers to the Creator" but as a smoker herself, she was frustrated when she would smoke and realize that she wasn't sending a positive message.

"What goes up must come down, that goes for smoke and prayers," Audrey says. "When things were not turning out in my life as I wanted, including being able to quit smoking, I realized something had to change, so I did. I set a date two months down the road. The last week, I opened my last package of cigarettes. I took out one cigarette and spoke to it every morning then set it back on the shelf; I told it "you" will be my last cigarette. This final cigarette made me dizzy, sick to my stomach it tasted like melted plastic and an old hemp bag and I resisted the desire to butt it out! This reminded me of my very first cigarette. Keep quitting until you get it

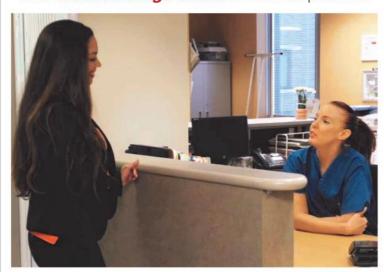

## RECIPE OF THE WEEK

## **Buffalo Chicken Dip**

Makes 16 servings; 1/4 cup serving Preparation: 30 min

Cook Time: 30 min (oven) 2-3 hrs (slow cooker)

#### INGREDIENTS

- 4 ounces cream cheese
- 1/2 cup bottled roasted red peppers
- 1 cup reduced-fat sour cream
- 4 teaspoons Tabasco® hot pepper sauce
- 2 cups cooked, shredded chicken

#### **DIRECTIONS**

Set the cream cheese out to soften. Drain the red peppers and measure 1/2 cup. Puree in a blender or food processor to make red pepper sauce. In a medium bowl mix cream cheese and sour cream together until smooth. Add pureed peppers and 2 teaspoons of Tabasco sauce. Stir until combined. Add the chicken and gently mix. Add additional hot sauce 1/2 teaspoon at a time; taste and continue to add hot sauce to the heat level you desire. Place mixture in a slow cooker for 2 to 3 hours on low heat, or bake in the oven at 350° F for 30 minutes. Serve warm dip with carrots, celery, cucumber, cauliflower for dipping, or make mini roll-ups by wrapping dip inside lettuce or cabbage leaves.
