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WRH and John McGivney Children's Centre (JMCC) Work To Improve Experience For Patients With Communication Challenges

A difficult experience for a patient who was unable to communicate with Emergency staff during a visit to Ouellette campus last year has resulted in a productive change, a new tool to help patients and staff communicate with each other.

This month, WRH launched a new communication tool for the ED to be used at both of their campuses. Developed in collaboration with the John McGivney Children's Centre, it aims to help patients who may have difficulty communicating their needs and instructs clinical staff on how to gain information for these patients without overwhelming him or her. This includes patients who use augmentative and/or alternative communication devices as their primary mode of communication, patients who have experienced a stroke or head injury, non-English speaking patients, and many others.

WRH's Speech and Language Pathology (SLP) Department and JMCC worked with the actual patient, Marlayna Durka-Knowles, who provided her input and later her approval for the new process ED staff can follow when trying to get information from a patient with communication challenges.

Durka-Knowles arrived at the ED by ambulance without her speech generating device and was unable to communicate her needs to the staff. She later sent a letter to WRH CEO David Musyj about the experience. David, along with Monica Staley-Liang, in her capacity as Vice President, Patient Relations & Legal Affairs, met with her and were moved by Marlayna's words and her willingness to help WRH develop a solution to make the patient experience better for individuals experiencing what Marlayna experiences daily. From there, WRH connected with JMCC to help develop a tool that would avoid similar situations with patients in the future.

WRH's SLP team members have trained ED staff at both campuses on this new tool. The organization sees the potential to expand the tool across all departments and floors of the hospital.

"On behalf of the Augmentative Communication Clinic at JMCC, we would like to extend our thanks to WRH for inviting us to participate in this exciting initiative. There are over 165,000 Ontario Residents who have disabilities that affect their speech and or their ability to understand what someone else is saying, so it is crucial that staff are able to find ways to communicate in an efficient, effective and respectful manor," said Toni Southern, Speech Language Pathologist, Augmentative Communication, JMCC.

BUTT OUT BY JAN. 1

Let's Help Patients BUTT OUT By Jan. 1!

As noted in previous editions of our newsletter, due to Ontario law taking effect on January 1, 2018, there will be no smoking allowed of cigarettes, e-cigarettes, medical marijuana or any other tobacco product on hospital property. This means, by law, we also must close ALL remaining Designated Smoking Areas on hospital grounds by New Year's Day.

We know change is difficult for everyone who smokes – including our own staff, as well as our own patients. If you are aware of a patient who wants to quit or could use some encouragement to quit, remember that since the summer of 2012, Windsor Regional Hospital has provided a smoking cessation program to our in-patient population.

A list of patients is generated every 24 hours in the Respiratory Therapy Department, identifying those patients who have declared themselves to be smokers during the admission process.

A Registered Respiratory Therapist will call upon each of those patients to complete a brief questionnaire which will help us determine a patient's readiness to quit. We ask how much they smoke, if they've attempted to quit in the past, how many times, if they're ready to try again, provide educational materials and to also offer nicotine replacement therapy during their stay here at Windsor Regional. While many patients through the years have been able to come outside and make use of our designated smoking areas, there have also been those, whose medical condition or mobility precludes them from doing so.

Nicotine replacement therapy, while here, will help assuage the desire to smoke as well as lessen the individual's anxiety knowing that they can't leave the building to do so. It's also hoped, that beginning nicotine replacement therapy, while here, will reduce their dependence on tobacco products and that they'll want to carry on with the process, once discharged, on their own accord, or with the help of our partners and programs offered through the Health Unit and elsewhere.

Our program has expanded through the years, allowing patients to request a smoking cessation consult on their own and has become more multi-disciplinary, including pharmacists, nurses, social workers and educators. It's a service that we're proud to provide and plan to do so for many years to come.


Look What It Costs!

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Morning Glory Muffins

Makes 18 servings Preparation: 20 min

Cook Time: 15 min - 25 min

INGREDIENTS

- 1 cup whole wheat flour
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1 tablespoon ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups grated carrots, (4 medium)
- 1 apple, peeled and finely chopped
- 1/2 cup raisins
- 1 large egg
- 2 large egg whites
- ½ cup apple butter
- 1/4 cup canola oil
- 1 tablespoon vanilla extract
- 2 tablespoons finely chopped walnuts, or pecans
- 2 tablespoons toasted wheat germ

DIRECTIONS

Preheat oven to 375°F. Coat 18 muffin cups with cooking spray. Whisk whole wheat flour, all-purpose flour, sugar, cinnamon, baking powder, baking soda and salt in a large bowl. Stir in carrots, apple and raisins. Whisk egg, egg whites, apple butter, oil and vanilla in a medium bowl. Make a well in the dry ingredients and stir in the wet ingredients with a rubber spatula until just combined. Spoon the batter into the prepared muffin cups, filling them about three-fourths full. Combine walnuts and wheat germ in a small bowl; sprinkle over the muffin tops. Bake the muffins until the tops are golden brown and spring back when touched lightly, 15 to 25 minutes. Let cool in the pans for 5 minutes. Loosen edges and turn muffins out onto a wire rack to cool.
