Farewell To Ron Foster And Ralph Nicoletti

We recently said goodbye to two Vice Presidents at Windsor Regional Hospital, Ron Foster and Ralph Nicoletti.

Ralph served in various leadership roles since 2006. In 2013, he became the Vice President of Medicine, Diagnostic Imaging, Emergency and Mental Health Services. In this role, Ralph provided support, guidance and direction to the Directors and Managers of these Acute Care departments as they developed, implemented and sustained improvements in processes and care delivery to ensure positive patient outcomes. Ralph was an invaluable leader before, during and after the historic realignment of acute care services in Windsor/Essex.

Ron Foster has held various positions since 1987. He became the Vice President of Public Affairs, Communications and Philanthropy in 2007. In addition, he was the Executive Director of the Windsor Regional Hospital Foundation. As Executive Director, Ron led the team that raised approximately \$2M to \$3.5M annually for the Windsor Regional Hospital Foundation. Ron was named Communicator of the Year in 2007 by the Ontario Hospital Association and in 2010 he received a Lifetime Achievement Award from the Association of Fundraising Professionals.

Barbeque-Style Slow **Cooker Pulled Beef**

Makes 10.5 servings. Preparation: 30 min Cooking: 6 hrs & 45 min



- 2 tbsp chili powder

- 6 cloves garlic, chopped

- 1/4 cup packed brown sugar

Ingredients

- 3 strips bacon, chopped
- 2 large onions, thinly sliced
- 1 jalapeño pepper, sliced thin 2 tsp kosher salt
- 1/2 tsp pepper
- 1/4 cup cider vinegar
- 2/3 cups ketchup - 2 tsp each smoked paprika and dry mustard
- 1/2 tsp cayenne pepper
- 1.5 kg boneless beef top blade pot roast/eye of round roast

Directions

In large skillet, cook bacon over medium heat, stirring often, until crisp, about 4 minutes. Add onions; cook, stirring occasionally, until onions are softened, 8 to 10 minutes. Add garlic, jalapeño pepper, chili powder, paprika, mustard and cayenne pepper; cook, stirring, for 1 minute. Stir in 1/2 cup water, scraping up browned bits. Sprinkle beef all over with salt and pepper; place in slow cooker. Scrape onion mixture over top; add brown sugar and vinegar. Cover and cook until beef is tender, about 6 hours on high or 10 hours on low. Transfer beef to cutting board: let rest for 10 minutes. Using 2 forks, shred or pull beef into bite-size pieces. Skim fat from surface of cooking liquid; reserve 1 cup of the cooking liquid in small bowl. Return beef to slow cooker; stir in ketchup. Cover and heat on warm for 10 minutes. Stir in enough of the reserved cooking liquid needed to reach desired consistency. Serve immediately with any remaining cooking liquid on the side, or cover and refrigerate for up to 24 hours.

Brain Injury CANNABIS, ADDICTION, AND MENTAL **HEALTH AFTER BRAIN INJURY**

Treatment Trends, Need to Knows, Research and Clinical Best Practice. for the Health Care Provider.

After brain injury, survivors will seek solutions to help resolve the lingering cognitive and emotional changes they experience. One of the solutions sought may be cannabis. With recent legalization of cannabis there is now easier access and less stigmatization of the product, and a renewed hope for recovery - but is this hope misplaced?



As most clinicians know: not all cannabis is created equal – some has positive impact, others negative. With increased access and common use of non-medical strains to self-medicate, it is timely for clinicians to become educated and understand their role in the process and the impact the product can have in the recovery of the brain injury survivor.
