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PET/CT Scanner Coming To WRH This Spring!

Last week, WRH announced some great news for hundreds of patients in Windsor and Essex County each year who need PET/CT scans to diagnose medical conditions – and currently have to travel hundreds of kilometers to hospitals in London, Hamilton, Mississauga and elsewhere to get them.

A new PET/CT scanner will be available to patients by late April or early May! The arrival of the scanner – long the standard for helping diagnose cancers – will support some 600 patients a year in the Windsor-Essex region and beyond. The machinery will be installed inside a small addition to be constructed adjacent to the Cancer Centre on the south side of Met Campus.

"Timely access to PET/CT diagnostic imaging is crucial in ensuring decision making and subsequent patient care plans are not delayed," said Monica Staley Liang, Regional Vice President, Cancer Services, Renal, Patient Relations, and Legal Affairs. "The absence of a reliable PET/CT scanner in Windsor-Essex forced large volumes of patients to travel significant distances to obtain these diagnostic images. The introduction of this technology at Windsor Regional Hospital means patients throughout the region can get these scans much closer to home."

Construction of a unit to house the scanner will begin shortly. It will be situated in a location that will allow it to be transferred eventually to the new hospital.

Among those who attended the event held in the Cancer Centre lobby on February 12th were our chief Oncologist, Dr. Sindu Kanjeekal, who spoke of the importance of Positron Emission Tomography, and Jeff Casey, a local community advocate and former cancer patient who spoke of his experience getting a PET scan and the importance it had during his cancer journey.

Also present were Houida Kassem of the Windsor Cancer Centre Foundation, whose Patient Assistance Fund has been helping with travel costs for patients who had to travel out of town for scans. Dave Cassidy, Unifor's Local 444 president, spoke about his mother-in-law's recent travel to Mississauga for a scan and thanked the Foundation for their efforts to provide assistance to local individuals and families.



Scrubs Thursday – Experiential Support
Every Thursday morning and afternoon for 2-3 hours all of WRH's Vice Presidents, Clinical Directors and Managers put on their scrubs and go to a designated nursing unit. While leaders are on the unit they will select a nurse, and be their support". During this 2-3 hour time period the leader will shadow the nurse as he/she goes through their regular duties



This is an opportunity to see first-hand, on a regular basis, how process changes like standard unit and patient flow are impacting the care providers, patients and family. This is protected time for the clinical leaders to offer 'experiential support', develop stronger relationships, and get feedback. Each month will also have a focus.

Why have a TOA?

- Patient handoffs are highly variable and error prone
- 70% of all sentinel events occur as a result of communication breakdown

What does the TOA do?

- Safe & effective coordination and continuity of care
- Essential information is consistently included
- Standardized tool and communication
- Provides an opportunity to ask and respond to questions
- Report in the same order every time
- Team work contract

#RECIPEOFTHEWEEK

Hot & Sour Soup

Makes 6 servings.
Preparation/Cooking: 30 min

INGREDIENTS

- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 3 green onions, thinly sliced (white and green parts separated)
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 (1-inch) piece ginger, peeled and julienned (about 1 tbsp)
- 1/2 teaspoon hot pepper flakes
- 2 cups sliced stemmed shiitake mushrooms
- 1 carrot , halved lengthwise and thinly sliced
- 1 (350 g) package extra-firm tofu, drained and cut in 1/2-inch cubes
- 7 cups sodium-reduced vegetable broth or chicken broth, warmed
- 1 tablespoon cornstarch
- 2 tablespoons white vinegar
- 1 tablespoon sodium-reduced soy sauce
- 1 teaspoon granulated sugar
- 1 cup thinly sliced trimmed snow peas
- 2 eggs , lightly beaten

DIRECTIONS

In large pot, heat oil over medium heat; cook white parts of green onions, the garlic, ginger and hot pepper flakes for 1 minute. Increase heat to medium-high. Add mushrooms and carrot; cook until carrot begins to soften, about 3 minutes. Add tofu; cook, stirring often, for 3 minutes. Increase heat to high. Add broth; cover and bring to boil. Reduce heat to medium; simmer, uncovered, for 10 minutes. Whisk cornstarch with 2 tbsp water; stir into broth mixture. Increase heat to high. Stir in vinegar, soy sauce, sugar and snow peas; bring to boil. Reduce heat to medium; simmer until slightly thickened, about 1 minute. Remove from heat; drizzle in eggs in thin steady stream, stirring constantly. Sprinkle with green parts of green onions; serve immediately.
