Did you know?

The 'Palm N Turn' child safety cap on medication bottle was developed in Windsor. Local Manufacturer, Peter Hedgewick, was enlisted by Dr. Henri Breault, a Windsor Paediatrician, to create the first child-resistant safety cap for prescription bottles in 1967. The 'Palm -N-Turn' technology, which is still being used today, requires users to push down while turning. By 1974, Ontario had made the use of child-resistant packaging mandatory. Similar regulations were quickly adopted internationally.

Mr. Hedgewick passed away this month but has left a legacy in the field of manufacturing in the city of Windsor.
