## **FIELD RESEARCH**



On Tuesday, members of the SOP team and our project leaders hit the road to explore transformation planning and improvement areas at St. Thomas Elgin General Hospital and the Toyota Assembly plant in Cambridge, Ontario.

As promised, here are some highlights from this learning experience:

"I learned how important it is to have everyone (all staff) "on Board" and working as a team when implementing

process changes for best performance records. Also, the importance of continuous/ scheduled communication huddles on a daily basis to help rectify problems or deficiencies in a department." - Shelley Persichilli, Booking Clerk, OR

"At the Toyota plant, I learned that ANY process can be improved, no matter how good it already is. We saw their row of award banners highlighting how the plant won multiple "platinum" awards for being the best/most efficient/safest plant in North America. Yet, they still implemented thousands of employee suggestions to make the plant even more efficient and safer. Yes, many of these suggestions are small, sometimes even trivial. But the lean process is based on continually implementing small beneficial changes that result in one great improvement over time." - Ben Parent, Decision Support Analyst
