STAFF VIA ZOOM:

Executive Committee

1. CALL TO ORDER:

The meeting was called to order at 1705 hours with Mr. Paniccia presiding as Chair and Ms. Sutherland recording the minutes.

2. DECLARATIONS OF CONFLICT OF INTEREST:

None declared.

3. PREVIOUS MINUTES:

The minutes of the January 6, 2022 Board meeting had been previously circulated.

MOVED by Mr. P. Lachance, **SECONDED** by Ms. C. Bissonnette and **CARRIED THAT** the minutes of the January 6, 2022 Board of Directors meeting be approved.

The Chair provided a couple of updates:

- ➤ Hats on for Healthcare the 13th annual Hats on for Healthcare campaign will take place March 2 30, 2022. This year it is a virtual event to support WRH's mental health programs. All details are available on the website.
- ➤ February 1 7, 2022 is Eating Disorder Awareness week. The Bulimia Anorexia Nervosa Association (BANA) will be hosting a virtual event and running various educational events online to spread awareness, educate and inspire others to take action to support those impacted by eating disorders. More information can be found at https://bana.ca/.

4. REPORT FROM THE PRESIDENT & CEO:

Mr. Musyj gave a verbal report accompanied by slides. The following are highlights from his report:

- i) Provincial snapshot and projections the Ontario Science Advisory Table has put together a range of scenarios however it is difficult to predict due to Omicron and level of community immunity. Mr. Musyj referred to the example scenarios on slide 1. All example scenarios assume a moderate increase in contacts as of January 31, 2022 with the reopening of the economy.
 - Mr. Musyj also spoke to the adult inpatient COVID and med/surg census and projections explaining Ontario does not have flexibility in the system with respect to critical care beds, especially in a surge as compared to Michigan.
- ii) Directive #2 a pause was put into place on January 5, 2022 based upon flex in the system. This created physical capacity in the hospital. Mr. Musyj advised there will be a gradual lifting of Directive #2 with a phased approach (Phases 1 through 4). Phase 1 allows the resumption of diagnostic imaging, cancer screening and scheduled ambulatory clinics at the discretion of individual hospitals. This does not include Day Surgery. There needs to be declining hospitalizations, reduced outbreaks and stabilized bed capacity before we can move to Phase 2, at which time we can do 70% of our 2019 surgery volumes. Phase 3 is 90% and then 100% or greater at Phase 4. Mr. Musyj acknowledged the amount of work the WRH team has done entering into Directive #2.
- iii) Swiss Cheese Model we must continue with all interventions in order to reduce the risk of acquiring or spreading COVID-19.
- iv) Vaccine Effectiveness unvaccinated people currently have a 6-fold higher risk of being in the hospital and a 12-fold higher risk of being in the ICU compared to those with 2 or 3 doses of the vaccine.
- v) Vaccine Data for W/E / Canada Dr. Saad spoke to the safety and side effects of the MRNA vaccines and presented data for W/E as well as Canada.
 - 75.6% of the W/E population are fully vaccinated. Since December 2020 December 31, 2021, there have been 89 ER visits to WRH related to vaccinations however only 2 patients were admitted, one with pericarditis and one with myocarditis. Both individuals have now received 3 doses of the vaccine.
 - In Canada there have been 75,026,797 vaccine doses administered. Dr. Saad advised there has been 35,211 adverse events reported, or 1 in 2,131 people. As of January 21, 2022 there has been a total of 277 reports of death in Canada. Dr. Saad explained that although these deaths occurred after vaccination, they are not necessarily related to the vaccine. The data presented also included the AstraZeneca vaccine.
- vi) Antiviral and Antibody treatment Dr. Saad reported. Windsor Regional Hospital has been approved to provide COVID-19 medications of monoclonal antibody and anti-viral medication to treat COVID-19 positive patients who meet very specific criteria established by the Ontario COVID-19 Science Advisory Table. There is currently a

limited supply of both medications. We have administered 16 doses to date of the monoclonal antibody medication. To date, we have not administered any Paxlovid. Dr. Saad advised there are a lot of drug interactions with Paxlovid such as blood pressure medication.

5. CNE REPORT

Ms. Riddell reported. This month's report focuses on the UNE program (Undergraduate Nurse Employee) as a follow up to the January report that touched on HHR strategies moving forward. Highlights are as follows:

- The UNE program is the most successful strategy WRH has implemented to date. The
 program was implemented early in the pandemic, March 2020 in order to bolster our
 HHR capacity. We expanded the program to also include Undergraduate Respiratory
 Therapy Employees, hiring RT students to assist WRH RTs with the increased demand
 for advanced respiratory support.
- This program has strengthened the solid partnerships with the University of Windsor and St. Clair College.
- We currently have 200 UNEs employed in every clinical area and also in COVID-specific areas such as the Assessment and Vaccination Centres.
- The Provincial Government initiated funding in early 2021 for an Extern Program to support implementation of this model at other hospitals. Ms. Riddell outlined the many benefits of the program. There is so much need to bolster our front-line providers. The WRH team would not be complete without the UNEs.

6. REPORT FROM SCHULICH:

Dr. Jacobs reported the following:

- Applications are now being received for the Schulich UWindsor Opportunities for Research Excellence Program. This program has been in place since 2014 and will provide funding for Schulich's Windsor Campus undergraduate medical education students to undertake a research project under the supervision of a University Faculty member.
- Nominations for the 2022 Awards of Excellence are now open. The event will be held on April 13, 2022.
- CaRMS Match Day for the 4th year class is set for April 12, 2022. The Windsor Campus has 10 Family Medicine positions for round 1 and 2 positions in Psychiatry.

7. Financial Presentation – November 30, 2021

Ms. Allen reported.

Slide 2 – Financial Results – Hospital Operations

- \$6.4 million deficit for hospital operations year to date
- The net deficit after building amortization is \$7,657,000
- COVID-19 unfunded ineligible expenses total \$3,936 based on the current reimbursement rules

- COVID has resulted in non-ministry revenues being under budget by \$3.7 million
- Unearned Ministry volume funding being under budget by \$5.1 million. A year ago that number was \$8.6 million a significant improvement.
- Recent communications indicate that the Ministry will require year-end
 reconciliations and recovery of unearned volume revenues and that non-ministry
 revenue shortfalls will not be funded. However we expect the advocacy by the
 Ontario Hospital Association and the hospitals themselves will see a similar plan as
 last fiscal year to make hospitals whole and not be negatively impacted by the
 pandemic.

Slide 3 – COVID-19 Impact on Expenses

• This slide shows the breakdown of where the \$3.9 million year to date in extraordinary expenses, and \$3.7 million in lost revenues are impacting our financial statements.

Slide 4 – Revenue

- Base and one time funding is \$25 million favourable due to amounts that have been accrued for known COVID-19 reimbursements. These include the Q1 & Q2 incremental expenses, temporary physician payments, vaccination and assessment centre funding, nursing extern funding and screening costs.
- Ministry drug reimbursements (for high cost drugs) favourable \$1,397,000 but these are offset by higher drug expenses.
- Patient Services Revenue \$2,449,000 favourable relates to uninsured patient revenue from the Ministry and higher diagnostic revenues which are offset by higher medical staff remuneration expense
- Other Recoveries favourable \$1,567,000 retail pharmacy revenues are offset by higher drug expenses

Slide 5 - Expenses

- \$32 million year to date unfavourable variance in expenses. The majority of these expenses are COVID-19-related and are confirmed or eligible for funding
- Medical/Surgical supplies are \$3,275,000 unfavourable due to increased use of PPE, depletion of donated PPE supplies and volume increases as procedure backlogs are addressed
- Drugs \$1.7 unfavourable, systemic and renal drugs are funded by Ontario Health and additional drug expenses in retail pharmacies are offset by recoveries as noted previously
- Other supplies variance of \$10.5 million and includes:
 - \$3,561,000 in additional e-Volve HIS project costs due to COVID-19 delays, which have been funded by the Ministry
 - \$3,456,000 for referred out vaccination centre expenses (City of Windsor and County of Essex EMS) also fully funded
 - \$1,940,000 for referred out cataract procedures which are fully funded

Year to Date Results include \$1.5 million in COVID-19 extraordinary expenses which are ineligible for funding. This relates to two items:

- 1) Wage rate differential for Nursing Externs. The maximum hourly rate per the agreement is \$20.60 per hour including benefits. WRH pays Externs \$25 per hour before benefits.
- 2) Difference between the actual cost of running the Assessment Centres and the funding at \$38 per swab.

 - \$4,040,000 for referred out vaccination centre expenses (City of Windsor and County of Essex EMS)
 - \$3,561,000 in additional e-Volve HIS project costs due to COVID-19 delays
 - \$2,119,000 for referred out cataract procedures

6.0 FOR DISCUSSION

6.1 Monthly Operating Results Report – January 31, 2022 (As Appended)

Ms. Zimmer provided the following highlights:

Operating results report for the ten months ended January 31, 2022 resulted in a deficit of \$3,569,000 (\$3,551,000 positive Hospital Margin).

> Items to note:

- Operating results include a combined \$45 million in higher costs and lost revenues related to COVID-19. Ministry has now confirmed that the COVID-10 expenses will be reimbursed through criteria applied in fiscal 2020-2021 for the entire fiscal year 2021-2022. Some costs such as PPE's are now eligible for reimbursement.
- WRH has received funding of \$709,800 for an additional 3 acute med/surg beds to be operational from October 1, 2021 to March 31, 2022. The revenue and expense is not included in the budget.
- WRH has received confirmation of funding for 2 critical care beds. Revenue and expense is included in the budget (for 8 beds). What has been funded for the first half of the fiscal year (April to September 2021), WRH will have a shortfall of approximately \$2.1 million annually for these beds. The January 2022 results reflect this adjustment of revenue for the 10 months.
- Please see appended results for in-depth review of the monthly financial statements.

6.2 <u>Status of 2021-22 Budget Risk Items – January 31, 2022</u>

The forecast was revised in a positive way as a result of the change by the Ministry as to what COVID-19 costs are now eligible for reimbursement.

Overall for Potential Hospital Margin: Best Case - \$17,699,000

Worst Case - \$536,000

Most Likely – \$12,111,000

- The operating results for the ten months ended January 31, 2022 resulted in a deficit of \$3,569,000 (\$3,551,000 positive Hospital Margin) based on the Ministry of Health (Ministry) definition. There are three items worth noting
 - a. Operating results include a combined \$45 million in higher costs and lost revenues attributable to meeting our clinical responsibilities related to COVID-19. The Ministry has now confirmed that COVID-19 expenses will be reimbursed via the criteria applied in fiscal 2020-2021 for the entire fiscal year 2021-2022. Some costs such as incremental PPE are now eligible for reimbursement. Revenue is recognized when funding confirmation has been received.

- b. WRH has received funding of \$709,800 for an additional 3 acute medical/surgical beds to be operational from October 1, 2021 to March 31, 2022. The associated revenue and expense for these beds is not included in the budget.
- c. WRH has received confirmation of funding for 2 critical care beds. The budget assumes that we will be funded for a total of 8 critical care beds. The associated revenue and expense for 8 beds is included in the budget. In December the Ministry confirmed funding for critical care beds for April to September 2021. Based on what has been funded for the first half of the fiscal year WRH will have a revenue shortfall of approximately \$2.1 million annually for these beds. The year to date January 2022 results reflect the adjustment of this revenue for ten months. We are following up with the Ministry as to this difference.

1. Financial Results for the Ten Months ended January 31, 2022 (Statement 2)

For the ten months ended January 31, 2022, the deficit after net building amortization is \$3,569,000, which is \$865,000 better than plan. This represents a positive Ministry of Health Margin of \$3,551,000 (one year ago, the margin was negative \$12,544,000). Combined extraordinary operating expenses and revenue losses related to COVID-19 in the amount of \$45 million are included in these results. Below is a chart that shows the revenue losses and costs that have been incurred in the period April 1, 2021 to January 31, 2022 and which have been funded and or not funded (eligible and ineligible for funding under the most recent guidance).

The ineligible compensation of \$1.55 million is made up of two items -

- 1) The rate difference for the Externs, the maximum hourly rate per the agreement with the Ministry is \$20.60 per hour including benefits. We pay \$25 per hour before benefits
- 2) The difference between the costs of the Assessment Centre and the funding recovery at \$38 per swab

It should be noted that with respect to Ministry volume based funding, we have unearned revenue for these ten (10) months of \$5.2 million as compared to \$13.4 million one year ago.

Revenue

Ministry revenue (combined base and one-time) is \$35 million higher than budget. The Hospital has received confirmation that incremental COVID-19 operating expenses incurred for the entire fiscal year will be funded under the same criteria as in 2020-2021. One time funding is favourable year to date as it includes accruals for revenue for which we have received a funding letter or Ministry confirmation. Included in this accrual is \$5,658,000 in funding for incremental expenses incurred from October 2021 to January 31,2022 per the updated guidance issued on February 3, 2022. One time funding includes the following:

- ♣ \$16 million for April 2021 to January 2022 incremental COVID-19 expenses (including screening)
- ♣ \$11.3 million for Vaccination Centre expenses
- ♣ \$6.8 million COVID-19 physician payments
- 4 \$2.8 million for Nursing Externs
- 4 \$2.1 million in Assessment Centre per swab funding

Originally, hospitals were informed that only costs for Vaccination Centres, patient repatriation and staff redeployment to long term care would be reimbursed through the COVID-19 incremental expense reimbursement process. The Ministry has now confirmed that incremental COVID-19 expenses for the entire fiscal year will be fully reimbursed. The Ministry is gathering additional information from hospitals regarding PPE purchases and has made PPE supplies available to hospitals from the provincial stockpile at no cost.

The preferred accommodation revenue variance is unfavourable to budget by \$2,520,000. Lower occupancy due to the reduced number of elective surgeries contributes to this shortfall, as well as the Ministry of Health directive that hospitals cannot bill uninsured patients for semi-private and private accommodation during the pandemic. Previously, uninsured patients would have paid out of pocket for this accommodation. Infection prevention and control measures often require patients to be placed in private rooms and we are unable to bill for this accommodation in these circumstances.

Chronic Co-payment revenue is \$34,000 under budget due to the factors mentioned above for preferred accommodation.

Patient Services revenue variance is \$2,652,000 favourable (10%) year to date, with much of the positive variance attributable to uninsured patient revenue. This revenue is reimbursed by the Ministry at the interprovincial billing rate which is higher than OHIP rates. Previously many of these accounts would have been uncollectible. Diagnostic revenues are \$900,000 higher than planned as initiatives to address backlogs have been implemented. These revenues are offset by an increase in related medical staff remuneration.

Equipment Grant amortization is ahead of budget \$389,000 (15.4% favourable). Timing of equipment purchases and confirmation of any corresponding grants affects this revenue.

Other Recoveries are \$2,277,000 favourable (6.5%) to budget. This revenue category is impacted by the reduction in hospital services earlier in the fiscal year. Revenues were significantly reduced for parking and retail food operations as volumes are lower due to visitation restrictions. These losses are offset by the combined surpluses in the retail pharmacies of \$700,000 year to date.

Expenses

Salaries are currently over budget (unfavourable) by \$9,278,000 (4.3%) year to date January 31, 2022. Salaries for COVID-19 screening (staff, patients and visitors), staffing of the Assessment Centres and the Vaccination Centre total \$10,507,000 to date. The hospital has received confirmation of continued funding for two (2) additional critical care beds over base for the full fiscal year. In addition, WRH has received funding confirmation of \$1,455,800 for six (6) additional critical care beds for April to September and we expect the same level of funding for October 2021 to March 2022.

Year to date spending for employees in paid isolation is \$452,000 and paid sick time due to COVID-19 is \$1,156,000. Both sick and isolation costs remain high due to the Omicron variant. January isolation costs were \$204,000 or 45% of the total year-to-date spend and COVID sick pay was \$637,000 or 55% of the total year-to-date spend. Temporary hires (Nursing Externs) have been paid \$3,837,000 to date. Professions included in the Enhanced Extern Program include undergraduate medicine students, respiratory therapy students, paramedic externs and recently expanded to include internationally educated nurses. This program is funded by the Ministry and is currently in effect until March 31, 2022.

Employee Benefits are unfavourable to budget by \$2,319,000 (4.3%). The variance is attributable to the higher than budget wage variance.

Employee Future Benefits are on budget. They are subkect to change pending the year end actuarial valuation.

Medical Staff Remuneration is over budget (unfavourable) by \$8,598,000 (19.4%). Of this variance, \$7 million is attributable to COVID-19 and will be funded through the

temporary physician funding for COVID-19. This funding has now been extended to September 30, 2022. The remaining variance occurs in diagnostic services as the costs of earning additional patient services revenue.

Medical & Surgical Supplies are unfavourable to budget by \$3,650,000 (11.8%) year to date. The main source of the deficit is the overall increase in Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) throughout the hospital. Additionally, most of the PPE that was donated in the early stages of the pandemic has been utilized requiring purchases to replenish supplies.

It should be noted that elective surgery cancellations affect the ability to reach QBP funded volumes and may result in some funding having to be returned to the Ministry at year-end.

Drug expenses are unfavourable by \$3,088,000 (5.3%) year to date. Retail pharmacy revenues more than offset this budget deficit and have a favourable net drug expense to revenue of \$709,000. The chemotherapy suite and renal program drug expenses to revenues are balanced.

Supplies and Other Expenses are unfavourable to budget by \$12,040,000 (20.6%). Significant deficits are as follows:

- \$4,040,000 for City of Windsor and Essex EMS Vaccination expenses
- \$3,561,000 million in additional costs incurred for the e-Volve HIS project due to COVID-19 related delays in implementation
- \$2,119,000 referred-out cataract cases
- \$1,114,000 building service equipment & service contracts
- \$935,000 minor equipment purchases (COVID-19 related)
- \$528,000 referred out laundry

Most of these costs have been funded through COVID one time funding or QBP funding. Offsetting some of the other supplies deficits is a surplus of \$965,000 in utilities due to the ongoing electricity rebate.

Long Term Interest expense is balanced.

Equipment Lease/Rental is \$161,000 unfavourable (8.2%) to budget to date. This deficit is attributable to equipment rentals for the Screening, Assessment and Vaccination centres. These costs are recovered through the COVID reimbursements.

Equipment amortization is \$224,000 (1.4%) over budget due to the timing of new additions.

Other Votes – Other Votes are \$33,000 favourable year to date.

Other Recoveries / (Expenses) - consistent with the prior year audited financial statement presentation, we have segregated the legal fees related to a particular legal

case. Year to date January 2022, these expenses amount to \$34,000 for which there was no budget.

2. Statement of Financial Position (Statement 3)

The Hospital continues to have challenges in trying to find suitable short-term investments for the cash balances on hand. Rates offered are lower than what we currently earn on accounts. Any increase in the prime rate will positively affect investment rates and additional opportunities to invest these funds.

Our Ministry / Ontario Health receivable has decreased by \$34.3 million from March 31, 2021. While we did receive the \$42.9 million in one time working capital funding accrued at March 31, 2021, the Ministry is slow to fund the eligible expenses for reimbursement related to temporary COVID-19 physician funding, Assessment Centre per-swab funding, Vaccination Centre, Screening and Nursing Extern funding. The confirmed amounts for the first two quarters' incremental operating expenses have been funded and as previously stated the funding for incremental expenses from October 2021 and January 2022 have been accrued. In addition, \$3.3 million in one time funding has been accrued for the additional acute and critical care beds.

Inventory is up \$1,994,000 when compared to March 31, 2021. The increase is attributable to drugs.

The market value of the sinking fund has increased by \$1,737,000 (6.95%) since March 31, 2021. The underlying cost base as a result of realized investment gains has increased by \$220,000 since the original \$25 million investment was made.

3. Patient Volumes

Acute patient days are below target at both campuses with the Met Campus 5,575 below target and the Ouellette Campus 3,650 below target (excl. psych). Surgical cases are 3,581 under plan at the Met Campus and 2,402 below plan at the Ouellette Campus. These lower cases contribute to the lower patient days.

We are still working to obtain outpatient volumes from the new HIS system. Thus explaining why a few of the indicators show as "TBD".

4. Organizational Health

The percentage of sick time year to date for the Met Campus is 6.5%, which is over the target of 4.7% by 1.8%, while overtime is .95% over target at 3.3%.

Sick time at the Ouellette Campus is 6.7% compared to the target of 4.7%, while overtime is over target at 6% year to date compared to the target of 2.35%.

Sick time percentages in the month of January were extremely high at 8.9% for the Met campus and 10% at the Ouellette campus.

Some of the increase in sick time costs at both campus relates to paying staff to remain home in isolation due to COVID-19. As a matter of practice, when we have inpatient units on "outbreak" affected staff are sent home to self-isolate. We are also assuming some of the incidental sick time is staff dealing with childcare issues.

With respect to FTEs, the Met Campus is unfavourable to budget by 9.9 FTEs. At the Ouellette Campus, the FTE variance is favourable by 13.5 FTEs. Overall, the Hospital is 130.5 FTEs over budget with 134.2 FTEs attributable to the staffing requirements at the Assessment and Vaccination Centres to date.
