1. CALL TO ORDER:

The meeting was called to order at 1705 hours with Mr. Paniccia presiding as Chair and Ms. Sutherland recording the minutes.

2. DECLARATIONS OF CONFLICT OF INTEREST:

None declared.

3. PREVIOUS MINUTES:

The minutes of the May 4, 2023 Board meeting had been previously circulated.

4. REPORT FROM THE PRESIDENT & CEO:

Mr. Musyj provided the following highlights:

• Mr. Musyj recalled the last time he stood in this Auditorium back in March 2020, preparing the staff for what was coming with respect to COVID-19. You could feel the intensity amongst the staff after hearing what was taking place in the emergency rooms in Detroit. We had to come together to help our community. Our staff did this and led by example doing a tremendous job and they continue to do so.

• There are many positive things to focus on now over three years later, one being our third MRI which will be up and running in the next few days adding thousands of additional scans for patients on an annual basis.

In December 2022, the Provincial Government announced funding for 27 new magnetic resonance imaging (MRI machines) across Ontario, including one at WRH's Ouellette Campus. Just over 22,000 MRI scans have been performed annually at WRH with the use of two machines. The addition of a third machine will bring that number to nearly 33,000 scans annually, which will largely help address wait times for non-urgent Priority 4 patients on our wait list for an MRI. There are approximately 5,400 Priority 4 patients with less severe ailments waiting for a scan, which most commonly involve chronic but non-critical ailments such as sore knees and shoulders.

Mr. Musyj spoke to wait times. Currently, the average wait time across the Province for a Priority 4 patient to get a MRI is 73 days, but at WRH, Priority 4 patients waited an average of 157-163 days. However, Priority 3 patients wait only 10-17 days as compared to a provincial average of 26. Priority 2 patients have no wait time locally as compared to 3 days provincially. ESHC will have their MRI up and running in 2024 and this will double the MRIs in our region and help with wait times.

A contributing factor to wait times has been patients not showing up to their appointments without any advance notice to the hospital. Last year, 1,291 appointments went unfilled because patients did not notify the hospital they were unable to attend. Mr. Musyj asked for help from the public - if you have a booked appointment and cannot make it please give WRH 24-hours' notice allowing staff to fill your spot with a patient currently on our wait list. To reschedule your MRI or any diagnostic imaging appointment you can call MRI at 519-254-5577 ext. 52863 7-days a week between 7:00a.m. - 11:00 p.m.

Slide 2 – Financial Results – YTD March 2023

- \$20,166,000 deficit for hospital operations year to date which is \$24,572,000 worse than budget
- The net deficit after building amortization is \$21,351,000 which is \$24,398,000 worse than budget

Slide 3 – Covid-19 Impact on Expenses

- This slide shows the breakdown of \$29.4 million in COVID-19 expenses and unearned revenue
- Unfunded COVID-19 expenses total \$5,830,000 due to
 - The wage differential for the Nursing Externs & S-PEP
 - Expenses no longer funded via incremental expense reimbursement (after June 2022)
 - Sick and isolation costs and additional staffing in the perioperative program
 - o Incremental PPE
 - o Additional shuttle costs, storage of equipment
- \$2,207,000 Pandemic Prevention and Containment funding has been applied to these expenses

Revenue shortfalls in the following three categories are not funded:

- Volume-based for Quality-Based Procedures (QBP), Neuro, Cardiac and Wait Time. When compared to the budgeted volumes there is a \$7.9 million shortfall
- \$3.3 million revenue loss in Patient Services
- \$720,000 revenue loss in Other Recoveries

Slide 4 – Significant Variances

- Salaries & Wage \$38,151,000 deficit
 - Partially offset by TRIN (Temporary Retention Incentive for Nurses) funding \$3,254,000

 - Offset by \$5,538,000 revenue in retail pharmacies

Updates on Influenza, COVID and RSV


As typical this time of year we look to Australia to see how their influenza season fared and get an idea of what we could be facing. If you recall last year Australia had an earlier than normal start to the influenza season and it resulted in a very quick increase in severity with a record number of positive cases and hospitalizations. This trend of an early season and sudden increase was followed in Ontario and Canada.

This is what Australia looks like this year and as compared to previous years.

You can see from the red line that the season started a couple weeks later than last year and very similar to 2019 experience. However, a slightly quicker drop off then 2019. About 50-60% of the number of cases at its peak then 2022.

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However the hospitalizations show a slightly worse situation then even 2022. Again, starts later BUT seems more sustained then even 2022.

Now to give it some perspective below is the influenza map for Canada for 2022-2023. It shows an earlier start to the season being around October 9, 2022. A dramatic increase BUT also a dramatic decrease. Very similar to Australia 2022-2023 influenza season.



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As a result, if we are to look to Australia it will be a couple week later start. More like October 23, 2023. A quick rise in cases. Not as high as 2022 BUT a more gradual decrease and possibly more hospitalizations then last year – more acute.




Figure 3 - Percentage of tests positive in Canada compared to previous seasons, week 2022-35 to 2023-11


The U.S. Food and Drug Administration's vaccine advisory panel met in June and decided vaccines for release sometime in September will be a monovalent vaccine targeting the Omicron subvariant. We are hearing it will be available for healthcare staff in October and general population early November.

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Locally a good indicator of what is to come is wastewater testing. So far this summer has been quiet. We will keep an eye on this issue. Generally it gives a week or so heads up on what to expect to see coming into hospital.



RSV

Through the Respiratory Syncytial Virus Prophylaxis for High-Risk Infants Program, the Ministry of Health covers the full cost of the drug palivizumab used



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to prevent a serious lower respiratory tract infection caused by the Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) in infants who are less than 2 years of age at the start of the RSV season and who are at high risk for RSV disease.

The drug is only provided during the active season to infants who meet the ministry's eligibility criteria for funding. The active season is generally from November to April, with variations in various regions of Ontario.

Health Canada has granted approval for GSK's Arexvy vaccine to prevent respiratory syncytial virus (RSV)-related lower respiratory tract disease (LRTD) in people aged 60 years and above.

A recombinant, AS01E-adjuvanted RSV vaccine, Arexvy is the first to obtain approval for use in older adults in the country. The latest development was based on the findings from a Phase III clinical trial programme in which Arexvy demonstrated 82.6% efficacy in preventing LRTD in older subjects. The vaccine also demonstrated an efficacy of 94.6% in individuals with underlying medical issues.

Specific dates of arrival of both the Paediatric monoclonal antibody treatment and Adult Arexvy vaccine are to be determined.

Surgery Waitlist Update

Pre COVID-19 as of March 19th, 2020 there were 5,346 patients waiting for surgery. As of Aug 21, 2023, there are 3,223 patients waiting for surgery. A reduction of 40%.

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More recently, WRH was directed by Ontario Health to develop a strategy to reduce the number of long waiter patients. A "long waiter" is defined as patients who are waiting greater than their priority timeline. As of Aug 21, 2023, there has been an 11% reduction in long waiters compared to March 25, 2023.

Orthopedic surgery had the highest volume of patients waiting for surgery and the highest volume of long waiters, they have been able to reduce their long waiters by 269 patients. Similarly, Gynecological surgery was able to reduce their long waiters by 177 patients and Oral and Maxillofacial and Dentistry has been able to reduce their long waiters by 196 patients. These surgeries include scheduled hip replacements, knee replacements, hysterectomies and pediatric dental procedures.

NPT Team Update



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The Windsor Police Service and Windsor Regional Hospital are pleased to announce the six-month extension of the **Nurse Police Team (NPT) pilot program** aimed at supporting individuals struggling with substance use disorders and related challenges.

The program, launched in May 2023, pairs nursing professionals with frontline police officers to provide proactive, holistic, and non-judgmental care to individuals in need and connect them with the appropriate support services. The initiative aims to introduce more meaningful treatment and support options while steering people away from the criminal justice system and hospital emergency departments.

Over the first 14 weeks of the pilot program, the nurse-police teams handled 374 calls for service, referred 253 people to the appropriate community resources, and treated 36 substance-related wounds. The proactive care enabled some 147 patients to be diverted from our already overcrowded hospital emergency rooms.

Project Update

The summer weather may be starting to cool, but things are continuing to heat up in the PMO office. Preparations are now underway to build and strengthen the

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team and ensure required expertise is in place to ensure a smooth transition into the next planning stage. This includes further development of the facility's design and the start of the tendering process to select a final design and builder for the new hospital.

Following a competitive bidding process, Angus Connect, a division of HHAngus & Associates Ltd., was selected to develop and implement the Information Communication Automation and Technology (ICAT) strategy for the New Windsor/Essex Acute Care Hospital (NWEACH) Project. This multidisciplinary team of IT, healthcare and engineering professionals will support the project through the indicative design, tendering and construction stages. Members bring a wealth of experience to the project, having worked on the ICAT strategy for a number of new hospital projects, including the Michael Garron Hospital that opened earlier this year in Toronto, the Joseph Brant Hospital in Burlington and the South Niagara Hospital project. Over the next several months, they will work with hospital leadership, User Groups, community members and patients to develop a vision and set of standards for the use of technology in the new state-ofthe-art hospital. As part of the process, they will examine opportunities for traditional and innovative uses of technology, including everything from nurse call, patient information, and entertainment systems to smart rooms and automated guided vehicles. Users will be guided to think outside of the box to imagine how technology can help ensure a seamless and comfortable journey for patients in the new hospital.

The tendering process is now underway to select an Operational Readiness consultant to ensure a smooth transition for staff and patients when the new hospital opens. The team is also currently evaluating bid submissions for a retail consultant, who will help us optimize the retail opportunities in the new hospital and ensure the right products and services are available and easily accessible. All open project-related procurement opportunities can be found online throughout the planning process at biddingo.com.

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The recruitment process for internal leadership to support the project is also underway. Job postings for several key leadership positions are now online. Everyone is encouraged to check out the hospital job board for more details, and share the postings with qualified individuals who may be interested being part of this transformative project.

The Ouellette Campus

Following the Stage 1.3 Submission to the Ministry of Health for the NWEACH project, in April, the team's focus has shifted to planning the future of the Ouellette Campus. The downtown location, which will include an urgent care centre, pharmacy, laboratory, diagnostic imaging and some outpatient procedures, is a critical part of future service delivery plans for the region. The goal of the planning team is to maximizing use of good infrastructure in the current facility, while providing safe and effective healthcare to the downtown core.

After meeting with relevant User Groups in early summer, the team at Parkin Architects is now drafting and refining options for the reuse of Ouellette. The Stage 1.3 submission is expected to be ready for submission to the Ministry of Health later this year. The submission will outline the future scope of services at the Ouellette Campus and support the Ministry in its ongoing review of the Stage 1.3 plans for the new hospital, by offering a complete picture as to how healthcare will be delivered in the region.

As well, \$113,250 in one-time funding related to critical care HHR initiatives. These budget amounts are reflected in the July 2023 financial statements.
 - No confirmation of bed funding received for 2023-2024. The budget reflects that the hospital will continue to be funded for the additional 8 critical care beds which has now been confirmed, 49 acute med/surg beds and 5 mental health beds.
 - The COVID-19 incremental expense funding is discontinued.
- > Significant variances are seen in Salaries & Wages, Medical Staff Fees, Med/Surg Supplies, Drugs and Other Supplies & Expenses.
- > Total weighted cases are up year over year.
- Patient days have increased.
- Ambulatory visits (clinics) have increased. Ambulatory will be changed to Outpatient Clinics in the monthly financial statements to avoid confusion of terms.
- > Emergency visits are higher and emergency patient days are also higher (an indicator of flow of patient(s)).

Operation Highlights:

- The operating results for the four months ended July 31, 2023 resulted in a deficit of \$4,894,000 and a negative Hospital Margin of (\$2,157,000) based on the Ministry of Health (Ministry) definition. There are four items worth noting
 - a. WRH's preliminary Hospital Annual Planning Submission (HAPS) budget was submitted assuming a 1% Growth and Efficiency Model (GEM) allocation per Ministry of Health guidance.
 - b. In June 2023 WRH received funding confirmation which included a 2% GEM allocation as well as some minor one time funding increases. These updates result in an increase in base revenue of \$6.9 million annually and a one time funding increase of \$113,000. These budget changes are included in the financial statement presentation.
 - c. WRH has not yet received formal confirmation of all bed permanency funding for fiscal 2023-24. The budget assumes that the hospital will continue to be funded for the additional 8 critical care beds (confirmed), 49 acute medical/surgical beds and 5 mental health beds that were approved in fiscal 2022-2023.
 - d. COVID-19 incremental expense funding is discontinued.

1. Financial Results for the Four Months ended July 31, 2023 (Statement 2)

For the four months ended July 31, 2022, the deficit after net building amortization is \$4,894,000, which is \$5,388,000 worse than plan. This represents a negative Ministry of Health Margin of \$2,157,000 (one year ago, the margin was positive \$2,015,000).

Revenue

Ministry revenue (combined base and one-time) is \$830,000 million (.5%) lower than budget. Base funding is under budget by \$2,332,000 due to payable amounts attributed to volume-based programs. The revenue shortfall for Quality Based Procedures (QBP's) is \$1,276,000 to date and payables for Cardiac programs total \$583,000. One time funding is favourable year to date as there is over performance in the cancer centre's leukemia and chemotherapy programs. The settlement process for global QBPs allows netting of under and over-performance for specific procedures but does not pay for net over-performance. This is in contrast to the cancer-related QBPs where over-performance is consistently funded.

Base and one time funding includes accruals for revenue included in the HAPS budget for which formal Ministry confirmation has not yet been received as follows:

- ♣ \$8.3 million for 49 Acute Medical/Surgical Beds
- ♣ \$2 million for 8 Critical Care Beds
- **♣** \$487,000 for 5 Mental Health Beds

Ministry drug reimbursements have a positive variance of \$1,926,000 (18.5%). This revenue comes from the Cancer Centre's New Drug Funding program and the renal program. This revenue offsets the corresponding drug expenses in both programs.

The preferred accommodation revenue variance is unfavourable to budget by \$958,000 which is \$77,000 better than prior year to date results for the same period. Infection prevention and control measures often require patients to be placed in private rooms and we are unable to bill for accommodation in these circumstances.

Chronic Co-payment revenue is \$85,000 better than budget. Effective October 1, 2022, patients designated as Alternate Level of Care (ALC) could be charged up to \$63.73 per day. Hospitals received notice that the co-payment rate increased to \$65.32 per day on July 1, 2023. The daily rate may be adjusted based on a co-payment assessment that takes into consideration the individual's income.

Patient Services revenue variance is \$712,000 favourable (6%) year to date. The majority of this surplus (\$616,000) is due to diagnostic revenues which are higher than planned as we continue to address wait times. These revenues are offset by an increase in medical staff remuneration.

Equipment Grant amortization is better than budget \$122,000 (10.3% favourable). Timing of equipment purchases and confirmation of any corresponding grants affects this revenue.

Other Recoveries are \$2,160,000 favourable (12%) to budget. \$1,100,000 of this surplus is due to drug sales and volume rebates in the retail pharmacies and some of this revenue is offset by increased drug costs. There is also significant favourability (\$1,059,000) in interest income as rates continue to rise.

Expenses

Salaries are currently over budget (unfavourable) by \$3,037,000 (3.4%) year to date July 31, 2023. The most significant factor in this variance is sick and overtime costs. The HAPS budget assumed significant overtime savings which have not been realized although there has been an improvement since March 31, 2023. Recent arbitration awards have expanded the number of situations where call-ins and overtime shifts attract double time making it difficult to decrease overtime costs. There has been an increase in training and orientation costs which are approximately 27% (\$406,000) higher than the same period last year. The additional training is required as WRH has created more permanent nursing positions for the additional beds in operation.

Employee Benefits are unfavourable to budget by \$1,502,000 (6.2%) as a result of increased salaries and wages.

Employee Future Benefits are lower than budget by \$38,000 (7.5%). This expense is lower than budgeted based on the actuarial valuation at March 31, 2023.

Medical Staff Remuneration is over budget (unfavourable) by \$744,000 (3.9%). The majority of this variance (\$624,000) occurs in diagnostic services and these higher costs are funded by the higher diagnostic services revenue noted above. The remaining variance is attributable to medical staff remuneration in the Intensive Care and Hospitalist programs which are greater than funding.

Medical & Surgical Supplies are unfavourable to budget by \$1,536,000 (11%). The overall increase in Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) throughout the hospital affects these costs. Perioperative program volumes are higher than planned adding to the deficit, however many of these procedures are funded QBPs and earn additional revenue. Hip and knee procedures are 60 cases over budget and there has been an increase in hip and knee revisions for which supply costs are greater than primary joint replacements. Pacemaker implants are 34 cases over budget and these are high cost procedures. Joint revisions and pacemakers are funded through Wait Times and earn funding only after minimum thresholds are achieved. Note that inflationary adjustments for medical & surgical supplies are not included in the HAPS budget.

Drug expenses are unfavourable by \$3,230,000 (12.2%) year to date. These expenses are somewhat offset by recoveries in the retail pharmacies (\$650,000) and by Ministry

funding in the chemotherapy suite and renal program (\$1,926,000). The remaining deficit is due to the higher costs of drugs, which are not included in the budget.

Supplies and Other Expenses are favourable to budget by \$156,000 (.6%). Deficits in building and equipment maintenance total \$753,000 to date but these are offset by surpluses in laboratory supplies (due to less COVID-19 testing), laundry and purchased services.

Long Term Interest expense is \$29,000 unfavourable (1.3%).

Equipment Lease/Rental is \$9,000 favourable (1.1%) to budget. These expenses vary based on bed rental utilization for bariatric patients or those with complex wounds.

Equipment amortization is \$1,447,000 (21.8%) under budget due to the timing of new asset additions.

Other Votes – Other Votes are \$83,000 unfavourable at July 31, 2023. The main source of this variance is the timing of revenue and expenses in certain funding envelopes. For example, WRH acts as the paymaster for the OH West Executive Office and for this program revenues are recognized equal to expenses incurred.

2. Statement of Financial Position (Statement 3)

The Ministry/Ontario Health receivable has increased by \$10.6 million from March 31, 2023 and is comprised mainly of funding for additional beds, drug reimbursements and timing differences for confirmed base and one-time funding.

Inventory has increased by \$153,000 when compared to March 31, 2023. This increase is attributable to drugs funded by OH-West (Cancer Care).

Our Ministry/CCO payable has increased by \$5.7 million from March 31, 2023. This is due to lower than planned volume-based procedures. In addition, a reserve is applied where funded volumes are higher than planned (budgeted). Note that at fiscal 2023 year end there were no payables recognized for unearned volumes as the ministry permitted hospitals to apply this revenue against operating pressures.

At July 31, 2023, the market value of the sinking fund has increased by \$3,408,000 (13.6%) since inception by \$940,000 since March 31, 2023. The underlying cost base as a result of realized investment gains has increased by \$1,920,000 since the original \$25 million investment was made and by \$88,000 since March 31, 2023.

3. Patient Volumes

Acute patient days are below target at the Met Campus by 1,533 days and equal to budget at the Ouellette Campus (excl. psych). Surgical cases are 545 under plan at the Met Campus and 1,405 below plan at the Ouellette Campus.

Combined ED visits and holds for the year are 1,320 below budget and 608 higher than last year at this time. Ambulatory and Community visits are 9,342 below plan and 7,969 lower than one year ago as the Covid-19 Assessment Centre is no longer operating.

Total weighted cases are estimated to be 353 lower than plan and 1,026 higher than one year ago.

4. Patient Access

Acute care length of stay at Met was 4.91 days as compared to a target of 4.54 days. Length of stay for Ouellette acute care was 8.42 days versus a plan of 7.33. Length of stay for the adult psychiatric patients was 1.9 days below the plan of 12.43 days and Maryvale (adolescent psychiatry) length of stay is 4.18 days compared to the target of 6.44.

5. Organizational Health

The percentage of sick time year to date for the Met Campus is 5.5%, which is over the target of 4.7% by .8%, while overtime is 1.15% over target at 3.5%.

Sick time at the Ouellette Campus is 5.5% compared to the target of 4.7%, while overtime is over target at 6.5% compared to the target of 2.35%.

With respect to FTEs, the Met Campus is unfavourable to budget by 24.7 FTEs. The largest deficits occur in the emergency department, housekeeping, plant operations and utilization (patient flow). At the Ouellette Campus, the FTE variance is favourable by 33.8 FTEs mainly in the perioperative program. Overall, the hospital is favourable 9.1 FTEs.
