STAFF VIA ZOOM:

Executive Committee

1. CALL TO ORDER:

The meeting was called to order at 1700 hours with Mr. Paniccia presiding as Chair and Ms. Sutherland recording the minutes.

2. DECLARATIONS OF CONFLICT OF INTEREST:

None declared.

3. PREVIOUS MINUTES:

The minutes of the October 7, 2021 Board meeting had been previously circulated.

MOVED by Mr. P. Lachance, **SECONDED** by Ms. P. France and **CARRIED THAT** the minutes of the October 7, 2021 Board of Directors meeting be approved.

The Chair provided information on the following fundraising campaigns:

- ➤ Grow On Windsor, a local fundraising campaign created by the Windsor Cancer Centre Foundation in 2015. The campaign takes place every November in support of cancer awareness, research and treatment for men living in our region. Funds stay local and helps support patients within the WRCC. You can donate directly on the website: https://windsorcancerfoundation.org/grow-on
- ➤ The WRH Mega Monthly 50/50 raffle continues for the month of November. Again, tickets can be purchased online.

4. REPORT FROM THE PRESIDENT & CEO:

Mr. Musyj reported. Highlights from his report are as follows:

i) Provincial trends of COVID+ patients: in the middle of October we had 500 cases per day. The 7 day average has started to increase slightly and as indicated by the Province Chief Medical Officer of Health, we anticipate cases will rise as we move indoors with the colder weather. As cases in the community go up, trailing indicators will be hospitalizations, ICU cases and unfortunately deaths.

- ii) As it stands right now in hospitals across the Province, 60% of COVID+ patients are unvaccinated or partially vaccinated. 85% of COVID+ patients in Ontario ICUs are unvaccinated or partially vaccinated. Mr. Musyj explained that we really need to continue to look at these numbers. This means 26% of the total population is not fully vaccinated. As vaccination rates go up the more these numbers will start moving.
- iii) Since June 29, 2021 WR has admitted 184 COVID-19+ patients, 73% have not been fully vaccinated. Of the 184, 42 patients have been admitted to the ICU. The trend, both provincially and internationally, is those not vaccinated are the ones being admitted to ICUs.

Another hot topic is infection-induced versus vaccine-induced immunity and Dr. Saad provided some information. People feel that if they have had COVID they have a natural immunity to the disease, however this is not enough to exempt them from being vaccinated. Emerging evidence coming from the US and other centres continues to strengthen the recommendation from the WRO, Health Canada and CDC, and that is vaccination after a natural infection is required to protect yourself in the long-term. Dr. Saad explained that antibody levels do not give a complete picture of whether someone is immune or not. Also, immune responses in individuals vary from person to person. Also studies show that if you have been infected and then get vaccinated you will have a more robust immune response than someone with just the vaccine.

Ms. Riddell provided an update on the Ouellette COVID AC and the MET PUMA AC:

- The Ouellette Assessment Centre focuses on 18 years of age and above (children are also seen when necessary) and is open 7 days a week from 0700-1500. Symptomatic testing only and by appointment.
- Met PUMA Assessment Centre focuses on 17 years of age and under, symptomatic testing only by appointment. Hours are 1200-2000 7 days a week. As of November 2, 2021 we have seen over 3500 children.
- There continues to be other community based free COVID-19 symptomatic testing in the community.
- Third doses are now available to an expanded group individuals 70 and over, health care workers and designated essential caregivers in congregate settings, indigenous populations and those who received the series of AstraZeneca or Johnson & Johnson. These individuals would have had to receive their 2nd dose at least six (6) months ago. Third doses are available at the mass vaccination site at Devonshire mall, by appointment only and also at participating pharmacies, healthcare providers and pop up vaccination clinics in Windsor-Essex. We are encouraging people to book their third doses. Mr. Musyj advised that we do not have a date yet for 5 11 year old vaccinations. We are waiting on Health Canada approval and following that a process will be provided with respect to distribution. The 5 11 year olds will get priority just like first and second doses. We will have a limited availability at that time and if you are eligible now you should book your third dose while you have the opportunity.

Mr. J. Foster outlined the new partnership between the RAAMP Clinic and the Erie St. Clair Regional Cancer Program. This is a cancer screening partnership for unattached patients or for those individuals who are having difficulty accessing screening. Many patients missed their 2020 screenings. Patients can book their own appointments through the RAAMP website or by calling the clinic. Cervical, Colorectal and OBSP cancer screenings have all fallen from due to the pandemic. This will assist primary care in getting caught up and doing more face to face visits. Mr. Foster explained the screening pathway that includes follow up and communication to the primary care provider. Mr. Musyj added that we are trying to help with early detection.

5. REPORT FROM SCHULICH:

Dr. Jacobs provided the following highlights:

- The Medical School is back to full in person leaning and things are going well. Western has a 99% vaccination rate on campus. There is still some work to do to catch up in some areas of the curriculum that could not get done as well as they could over the last 18 months. Confident with some strategies that this will be completed this academic year.
- Thank you to the hospital for finding capacity to accept increased medical learners on campus as some could not travel due to the pandemic.

6. Financial Presentation & Treasurer's Report – September 30, 2021

Ms. Allen reported.

Slide 2 – Financial Results – Hospital Operations

- \$2.3 million deficit for hospital operations year to date.
- The net deficit after building amortization is \$3,158,000.
- COVID-19 unfunded expenses total \$4,258,000 to date.
- Unfunded non-ministry revenues and unearned volume funding total \$6.8 million.

Slide 3 - Funding

- In September we received a one-time funding letter for \$709,800 for three (3) additional acute med/Surg beds to be operational from October 1st to March 31st.
- The Ministry has confirmed that Q1 incremental expenses submitted will be funded and therefore \$3 million of this funding has been accrued.

Revenue

 Base and one time funding is \$15.6 million favourable due to amounts that have been accrued for known COVID-19 reimbursements. These include the Q1 incremental expenses, temporary physician payments, vaccination and assessment centre funding and nursing extern funding.

Slide 4 – COVID-19 Impact on Expenses

• 4.3 million year to date in extraordinary expenses for which funding has not yet been received or confirmed – these are for the Q2 incremental expenses.

Slide 5 – Expenses

- Salaries and Benefits combined are unfavourable \$4.7 million due to additional staffing for screening, the assessment and vaccination centre.
- Additional Med Fees (\$4.8 million over budget)
 - \$3.8 million are physician fees related to COVID and are fully funded
 - Remaining variance in diagnostic services as the cost of earning additional patient services revenues
- Med/Surg supply deficit is \$1.6 million to date due to higher than budgeted Personal Protection Equipment costs (PPE – masks, gowns and gloves). To date additional PPE costs are \$2.5 million.
- Drugs are unfavourable \$828,000 to date but are offset by higher favourable retail pharmacy revenues.
- Other supplies are unfavourable by \$3.3 million mainly due to referred out expenses.
- Note the surplus of \$964,000 in utilities due to the continuation of the electricity rebate that we have mentioned before.

Financial Results October 31, 2021

Funding

- Ministry has now confirmed Q1 & Q2 incremental COVID-19 expenses submitted will be funded
 - \$6.2 million in funding has been accrued for these expenses
- Hospitals have received guidance on funding for Q3 and Q4 incremental expenses
 - Screening costs remain eligible for reimbursement
 - Some costs such as incremental PPE will no longer be reimbursed

Year to Date Revenue

- Base and One-Time Funding \$20.8 million favourable
 - Mainly due to amounts accrued for known COVID-19 reimbursements
- Patient Services Revenue \$1,767,000 favourable relates to uninsured patient revenue from the
 Ministry and higher diagnostic revenues which are offset by higher medical staff remuneration expense

6.0 FOR DISCUSSION

6.1 Monthly Operating Results Report – October 31, 2021 (As Appended)

Ms. Zimmer provided the following highlights:

➤ Operating results report for the seven months ended October 31, 2021 resulted in a deficit of \$4,282,000 (\$679,000 positive Hospital Margin).

> Items to note:

- Operating results include a combined \$32 million in higher costs and lost revenues due to COVID-19. Ministry has confirmed that the COVID-10 expenses will be reimbursed through criteria applied in fiscal 2020-2021 for the first two quarters of fiscal year 2021-2022. The hospital has received communication regarding criteria for reimbursement for the last two quarters of the fiscal year.
- WRH has received funding confirmation from the Ministry of \$16.4 million for 32 acute medical/surgical beds and 5 acute mental health beds to be operational for entire fiscal year.
- Funding amounting to \$709,800 has been received for an additional 3 acute medical/surgical beds to be in operation from October 1, 2021 to March 31, 2022.
- COVID-19 year-to-date results include \$1.7 million in COVID-19 extraordinary expenses which are ineligible for funding.
- Net revenue losses total \$7.7 million.
- Base and one-time funding \$15.6 million favourable.
- Preferred Accommodations and Co-Payment Revenue \$1.96 unfavourable.
- Patient services revenue \$1.76 favourable.
- Other recoveries \$972,000 favourable.
- Year-to-date expenses \$24 million year-to-date unfavourable variance in expenses of which Drugs are \$2.2 million unfavourable and Other supplies with an unfavourable variance of \$7.0 million.

It is noted at the meeting that an error was found on Statement #2 – COVID-19 extraordinary operating expenses unfunded – ineligible will be corrected from \$4,842,000 to \$1,740,000.

6.2 <u>Status of 2021-22 Budget Risk Items – October 31, 2021</u>

Ms. Zimmer provided the status of budget risk items. Highlights included:

- Best case, worse case and most likely; projections are the same as in the previous month. Looking at one time revenues due to COVID-19 expenses being reimbursed in Q1 and 2 and designated expenses only reimbursed in Q3 and 4.
- Also, an estimate using the data that we have to date and what projections will be in terms of OR volumes and wait time volumes to see where our QBP and wait time revenues will end up.
- Anticipated that drug expenses will trend as they are currently and offsets being favourable.
- Not much change in preferred accommodation.
- Diagnostic volumes will continue as is to address backlog.
- Retain pharmacy revenue continue to trend favourably.
- Medical fees funded due to COVID-19.
- Rental of tent for screening and assessment centre, trailer for PUMA.

Operation Highlights:

- The operating results for the seven months ended October 31, 2021 resulted in a deficit of \$4,282,000 (\$679,000 positive Hospital Margin) based on the Ministry of Health (Ministry) definition. There are three items worth noting
 - a. Operating results include a combined \$32 million in higher costs and lost revenues attributable to meeting our clinical responsibilities related to COVID-19. The Ministry has confirmed that COVID-19 expenses will be reimbursed via the criteria applied in fiscal 2020-2021 for the first two quarters of fiscal 2021-2022 only. Hospitals have received communications regarding reimbursement criteria for the last two quarters of the fiscal year. Screening costs remain eligible for reimbursement, however some costs such as incremental PPE will no longer be reimbursed. Revenue is recognized when funding confirmation has been received.
 - b. WRH has received funding confirmation from the Ministry of \$16.4 million for 32 acute medical/surgical beds and 5 acute mental health beds to be operational for the full fiscal year. Both the revenue and expenses associated with the operation of these beds is included in the budget.

c. WRH has also received funding of \$709,800 for an additional 3 acute medical/surgical beds to be operational from October 1, 2021 to March 31, 2022. The associated revenue and expense for these beds is not included in the budget.

1. Financial Results for the Seven Months ended October 31, 2021 (Statement 2)

For the seven months ended October 31, 2021, the deficit after net building amortization is \$4,282,000, which is \$964,000 worse than plan. This represents a positive Ministry of Health Margin of \$679,000 (one year ago, the margin was positive \$2,637,000). Combined extraordinary operating expenses and revenue losses related to COVID-19 in the amount of \$32 million are included in these results. In the month of October, the COVID-19 impact was \$3.1 million. Below is a chart that shows the revenue losses and costs that have been incurred in the period April 1, 2021 to October 31, 2021 and which have been funded and or not funded (eligible and ineligible for funding under the new criteria).

It should be noted that with respect to Ministry volume based funding, we have unearned revenue for these seven (7) months of \$4,585,000 as compared to \$4,618,000 one year ago.

Revenue

Ministry revenue (combined base and one-time) is \$20.8 million higher than budget. The Hospital has received confirmation that incremental COVID-19 operating expenses incurred from April to September 2021 will be funded. One time funding is favourable year to date as it includes accruals for revenue for which we have received a funding letter or Ministry confirmation. One time funding includes the following accruals:

- \$6.2 million for April to September 2021 incremental COVID-19 expenses
- \$4.0 million COVID-19 physician payments
- ♣ \$8.2 million for Vaccination Centre expenses
- ♣ \$2.0 million for Nursing Externs
- \$1.4 million in Assessment Centre per swab funding.

Originally hospitals were informed that only costs for Vaccination Centres, patient repatriation and staff redeployment to long term care would be reimbursed through the COVID-19 incremental expense reimbursement process. The Ministry has now confirmed that incremental COVID-19 expenses for the first two quarters of the fiscal year will be fully reimbursed. As expected, for Q3 and Q4 only specific expenses (vaccination centres, assessment centres, patient repatriation and screening costs) will be funded. PPE purchases after October 1, 2021 are not eligible for reimbursement except in certain circumstances. The Ministry is gathering additional information from hospitals regarding PPE purchases and has made PPE supplies available to hospitals from the provincial stockpile at no cost.

The preferred accommodation revenue variance is unfavourable to budget by \$1,935,000. Lower occupancy due to the reduced number of elective surgeries contributes to this shortfall, as well as the Ministry of Health directive that hospitals cannot bill uninsured patients for semi-private and private accommodation during the pandemic. Previously, uninsured patients would have paid out of pocket for this accommodation. Infection prevention and control measures often require patients to be placed in private rooms and we are unable to bill for this accommodation in these circumstances.

Chronic Co-payment revenue is \$25,000 under budget due to the factors mentioned above for preferred accommodation.

Patient Services revenue variance is \$1,767,000 favourable (9.5%) year to date, with much of the positive variance attributable to uninsured patient revenue which is reimbursed by the Ministry at the interprovincial billing rate which is higher than OHIP rates. Previously many of these accounts would have been uncollectible. Diagnostic revenues are \$600,000 higher than planned as initiatives to address backlogs have been implemented. These revenues are offset by an increase in related medical staff remuneration.

Equipment Grant amortization is ahead of budget \$326,000 (18.4% favourable). Timing of equipment purchases impacts this revenue.

Other Recoveries are \$972,000 favourable (3.9%) to budget. This revenue category is impacted by the reduction in hospital services earlier in the fiscal year. Revenues were significantly reduced for parking and retail food operations as volumes are lower due to visitation restrictions. These losses are offset by the combined surpluses in retail pharmacies of \$1.6 million year to date.

Expenses

Salaries are currently over budget (unfavourable) by \$5,615,000 (3.7%) year to date October 31, 2021. Salaries for COVID-19 screening (staff, patients and visitors), staffing of the Assessment Centres and the Vaccination Centre totalled \$6,943,000 to date. The hospital has received confirmation of continued funding for 2 additional critical care beds over base and funding for 6 additional beds is expected. Therefore, the budget includes the revenue and expenses associated with 8 additional critical care beds operating for the full fiscal year.

Year to date spending for employees in paid isolation is \$165,000 and paid sick time due to COVID-19 is \$320,000. Temporary hires (Nursing Externs) have been paid \$2,656,000 to date. Professions included in the Enhanced Extern Program include undergraduate medicine students, respiratory therapy students, paramedic externs and recently expanded to include internationally educated nurses. This program is funded by the Ministry and is in effect from January 1, 2021 to March 31, 2022.

Employee Benefits are unfavourable to budget by \$1,870,000 (4.9%). The variance is attributable to the wage variance.

Employee Future Benefits are on budget.

Medical Staff Remuneration is over budget (unfavourable) by \$5,527,000 (17.8%). Of this variance, \$4.2 million is attributable to COVID-19 and will be funded through the temporary physician funding for COVID-19. This funding has now been extended to September 30, 2022. The remaining variance occurs in diagnostic services as the costs of earning additional patient services revenue.

Medical & Surgical Supplies are unfavourable to budget by \$1,780,000 (8.2%) year to date. Similar to last fiscal year, the perioperative programs at both sites are favourable to budget due to reductions in surgical volumes. The overall surplus in these programs is \$115,000 to date and continues to decline each month as surgical backlogs for procedures such as hip and knee replacements are being addressed. The perioperative surplus is offset by the overall increase in Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) throughout the hospital. Incremental costs for PPE are approximately \$25 per patient day higher than pre-COVID-19 rates and total \$2.7 million year to date October 2021 when compared to pre-pandemic spending. As previously mentioned, PPE purchases after October 1, 2021 are not eligible for reimbursement.

It should be noted that elective surgery cancellations affect the ability to reach QBP funded volumes and may result in some funding having to be returned to the Ministry at year-end.

Drug expenses are unfavourable by \$2,201,000 (5.4%) year to date. Retail pharmacy revenues more than offset this budget deficit and have a favourable net drug expense to revenue of \$490,000. The chemotherapy suite and renal program drug expenses to revenues are balanced.

Supplies and Other Expenses are unfavourable to budget by \$7,027,000 (17.2%). \$3,561,000 million of this deficit is due additional costs incurred for the e-Volve HIS project due to delays in implementation as a results COVID-19. These expenses were included in the Q1 and Q2 COVID-19 incremental expense submissions. We have received confirmation that these expenses will be funded and have therefore recognized the offsetting revenue. Other significant deficits have been incurred for referred out expenses such as cataract procedures (\$1,512,000 to date) and the City of Windsor Vaccination Centre (\$2,868,000). The City of Windsor costs are eligible for and are being submitted for reimbursement. Offsetting some of the other supplies deficits is a surplus of \$783,000 in utilities due to the ongoing rebate.

Long Term Interest expense is balanced.

Equipment Lease/Rental is \$138,000 unfavourable (10.1%) to budget to date. This deficit is attributable to equipment rentals for the Screening, Assessment and Vaccination centres.

Equipment amortization is \$179,000 (2.9%) under budget due to the timing of new additions. Amortization of the e-Volve HIS project began in October and is included in the year to date expense in the amount of \$297,000.

Other Votes – Other Votes are \$25,000 favourable year to date.

Other Recoveries *I* (Expenses) – consistent with the prior year audited financial statement presentation, we have segregated the legal fees related to a particular legal case. Year to date October 2021, these expenses amount to \$24,000 and are unfavourable to budget.

2. Statement of Financial Position (Statement 3)

The Hospital continues to have challenges in trying to find suitable short-term investments for the cash balances on hand. Rates offered are lower than what we currently earn on accounts. We anticipate this will change as we are starting to see financial institutions being open to provide competitive quotes. There may be a slight increase in the prime rate in the coming months as well which will positively impact investment rates.

Our Ministry / Ontario Health receivable has decreased by \$22.7 million from March 31,2021 as we have received the \$42.9 million in one time working capital funding accrued at March 31, 2021. The Ministry receivable is comprised of temporary COVID-19 physician funding, Assessment Centre per-swab funding, Vaccination Centre, Nursing Extern funding and the confimed amounts for the first two quarters' incremental operating expenses. In addition, \$4 million in one time funding has been accrued for the additional acute and critical care beds.

The drug inventory count took place on September 30, 2021. A positive inventory adjustment of \$124,000 (.35% of the YTD September expense) was recorded in October 2021.

Through October 2021, the market value of the sinking fund has increased by \$1,324,000 (5.3%) since March 31, 2021. The underlying cost base as a result of realized investment gains has increased by \$111,000 since the original \$25 million investment was made.

3. Patient Volumes

Acute patient days are below target at both campuses with the Met Campus 2,240 below target and the Ouellette Campus 2,871 below target. Surgical cases are 2,629 under plan at the Met Campus and 1,396 below plan at the Ouellette Campus.

We are still working to obtain outpatient volumes from the new HIS system. Thus explaining why a few of the indicators show as "TBD".

4. Organizational Health

The percentage of sick time year to date for the Met Campus is 6.3%, which is over the target of 4.7% by 1.6%, while overtime is .85% over target at 3.2%.

Sick time at the Ouellette Campus is 6.3% compared to the target of 4.7%, while overtime is over target at 5.9% year to date compared to the target of 2.35%.

Some of the increase in sick time costs at both campus relates to paying staff to remain home in isolation due to COVID-19. As a matter of practice, when we have inpatient units on "outbreak" affected staff are sent home to self isolate. We are also assuming some of the incidental sick time is staff dealing with childcare issues.

With respect to FTEs, the Met Campus is unfavourable to budget by 11.1 FTEs. At the Ouellette Campus, the FTE variance is favourable by 15.7 FTEs.

Overall, the Hospital is 126.3 FTEs over budget with 130.8 FTEs attributable to Staff/Visitor Screening, the Assessment Centre and the Vaccination Centres to date.
