1. CALL TO ORDER:

The meeting was called to order at 1700 hours with Mr. Paniccia presiding as Chair and Ms. Sutherland recording the minutes.

2. DECLARATIONS OF CONFLICT OF INTEREST:

None declared.

3. PREVIOUS MINUTES:

The minutes of the November 4, 2021 Board meeting had been previously circulated.

The Chair provided a couple of reminders:

- ➤ Donation of toys to pediatric unit thank you for all the generosity however these toys would be better served to the Hiatus House or CAS. To make a donation to the pediatric unit please visit the WRH website.

Thank you to the staff for continuing to support our community during this pandemic. Thank you to our fellow partners for making this year as successful as it could be. Also, thank you to the community for their ongoing support. Please get vaccinated and/or book your booster if eligible. Have a safe and happy holiday.

4. REPORT FROM THE PRESIDENT & CEO:

Mr. Musyj thanked everyone for attending tonight's meeting. Highlights from his report are as follows:

- i) Provincial trends of COVID+ patients: rolling 7 day average continues to increase with 1290 new cases today in Ontario. 99.9% of these cases are the Delta variant, Omicron has not taken effect as of yet.
- ii) W/E Trends the weekly cases show that W/E is at 114 per 100,000 of our population and our positivity rate is just under 6%. Our weekly case counts have gone down a bit however this is trending back up based on today's results. W/E is in the top 4 in the Province. Mr. Musyj spoke of where we were last year at this time. Last year at this time our case counts were running at 67.3 positive cases per day and we are now running at 68.9 today, which is slightly above. Therefore, the issue becomes what is going to happen over the next few weeks with respect to our case counts and where are they going to go.
- iii) Vaccination Rates and Efficacy 84.665% of people 5+ in Ontario have received at least one dose and 80.147% of people 5+ in Ontario are fully vaccinated. However we still have over 70% of our inpatients who are unvaccinated. The Science Table report that was just released stated that unvaccinated people have a 5-fold higher risk of symptomatic COVID-19 disease, a 13-fold higher risk of being in the hospital and a 23-fold higher risk of being in the ICU compared to those fully vaccinated. As our Public Medical Officer of Health pointed out today, unfortunately there are still unvaccinated people in our community dying from COVID-19.
- iv) Rapid antigen tests Mr. Musyj explained the "swiss cheese" or layered approach You need all of these things to be lined up to prevent spread and all of these factors play an important role. WRH has done most if not all of these things. This was most recently articulated today by the Science Table in their report on rapid antigen tests for voluntary screen testing and making them more widely available to the community. WRH started this for our staff back in August. There have been more than a dozen cases where a staff member had a young person in their home who at the time was not eligible for vaccination who became positive and this was discovered by the at home rapid antigen testing kit. As a result, this prevented the child from going back to school and spreading COVID-19 any further and also preventing the staff member from coming into the hospital and spreading it. Once the rapid test is positive, the staff and family members then go to the AC and get a PCR test. The rapid kits produce immediate, accurate results and are a useful tool for detecting COVID-19 early and isolating infected people before they have a chance to spread the virus. Dr. Saad explained CT values and what they mean in PCR testing. We recommend to our staff to test 2 -3 times per week. If you do this frequently you are most likely going to catch a positive.

Ms. Riddell presented local ESC statistics as of today's date:

- 22 active COVID-19 cases in house, 5 of which are in the ICU. 6 of these cases are fully vaccinated (14 days post second dose) and 3 are partially vaccinated (14 days post first dose or 0-13 days posts second dose). 13 are not vaccinated. 73% of our current cases in house are partially or unvaccinated. This data is published on a daily basis.
- Overall bed capacity has been challenging over the last couple of weeks. WRH has added 35 Med/Surg beds and 5 Mental Health beds. Capacity today is running at 90% and the majority of the COVID-19 cases are at the Met Campus. We cohort ICU cases at MET to preserve trauma, cardiac, renal, neurosurgery and vascular capacity at the Ouellette Campus.
- ED volumes are trending at approximately 120-130 daily at each site with a 20% admission rate. You can see how quickly capacity at the hospital can be impacted.
- In addition to the 22 active cases, we still have an additional 11 patients in acute care who are "no longer infectious", 5 of which are in the ICU.

Dr. Saad provided some information on Omicron and boosters. There are still a lot of unknowns but Omicron appears to be more transmissible than Delta however it is too soon to say if it is more deadly. There is some preliminary data that suggests our current vaccinations, particularly with the mRNA vaccines, will protect against Omicron with the caveat that your immune system is boosted. Boosters

improve your immune reaction and offer more protection. Dr. Saad advised there are no confirmed local cases however there are some in the province.

Mr. Musyj announced that individuals 50+ can now book their booster on the WEVax website starting as early as Monday, December 13th. Vaccines for 5- 11 year olds are still available. Walk-ins available for 1st and 2nd doses other than children 5- 11. UK is projecting Omicron will surpass Delta over the next few weeks. Again, we appreciate the community support and the vaccination efforts. There could be changes coming with respect to vaccine passports.

Mr. Musyj wished the board members and the community a happy and safe holiday. Please adhere to public health measures and rules.

5. REPORT FROM SCHULICH:

Dr. Jacobs referred to his written report and provided the following highlights:

- Medical education is going well and the Windsor Campus was able to get through the first semester with no blips of COVID-19 cases.
- Received a visit from Dean Yoo on November 26th. The agenda of that meeting was to meet with faculty in Windsor to recognize the amazing work that is happening in W/E with respect to medical education. Over the last 10-15 years the faculty in Windsor has moved from a group who delivered curriculum to a group that is now developing curriculum. This is a huge win for the community and very exciting as move into the development and planning for the new acute hospital site.
- This is a challenging time for medical education and healthcare and as a result we are seeing a lot of stress and burnout. The Windsor Campus is pleased to announce the hiring of a full-time therapist to provide counseling to students. This is a combined role with the Faculty of Nursing at the University.

6. Financial Presentation & Treasurer's Report – October 31, 2021

Ms. Allen reported.

Slide 2 – Financial Results – Hospital Operations

- \$3.3 million deficit for hospital operations year to date.
- The net deficit after building amortization is \$4,282.
- COVID-19 unfunded but eligible expenses total \$1,935 to date, ineligible total \$1,740.
- Unfunded non-ministry revenues and unearned volume funding total \$7.7 million.

Slide 3 – Funding

- The Ministry has now confirmed that both Q1 and Q2 incremental expenses submitted will be funded and therefore a total of \$6.2 million of this funding has been accrued.
 - For Q3 and Q4, screening cost remain eligible for funding, however incremental PPE cost are no longer funded.
 - The Ministry has made PPE supplies available from the provincial stockpile at no cost to hospitals.

Revenue

 Base and one time funding is \$20.8 million favourable due to amounts that have been accrued for known COVID-19 reimbursements. These include the Q1 & Q2 incremental expenses, temporary physician payments, vaccination and assessment centre funding and nursing extern funding. • Patient Services Revenue \$1,767,000 favourable – relates to uninsured patient revenue from the Ministry and higher diagnostic revenues which are offset by higher medical staff remuneration expense.

Slide 4 – COVID-19 Impact on Expenses

- \$1.7 million year to date in extraordinary expenses, and \$3.1 million in lost revenues for a total of \$4.8 million that is unfunded or is currently ineligible for funding.
- Hospitals are still waiting for communications regarding treatment of lost revenues.

Slide 5 – Expenses

- \$24 million year to date unfavourable variance in expenses, however, \$29 million of the total \$32 million in COVID-19 expenses are confirmed/eligible for funding.
- Drugs \$2.2 unfavourable, systemic and renal drugs are funded by Ontario Health and additional drug expenses in retail pharmacies are offset by recoveries.
- Other supplies variance includes \$3,561,000 additional e-Volve HIS project costs due to COVID-19 delays for which we have received funding confirmation.
- Utilities are favourable \$1,097,000 year to date due to the continuing electricity rebate.

6.1 Monthly Operating Results Report – November 30, 2021 (As Appended)

Ms. Zimmer provided the following highlights:

➤ Operating results report for the eight months ended November 30, 2021 resulted in a deficit of \$5,504,000 (\$185,000 positive Hospital Margin).

> Items to note:

- Operating results include a combined \$35.6 million in higher costs and lost revenues due to COVID-19. Ministry has confirmed that the COVID-10 expenses will be reimbursed through criteria applied in fiscal 2020-2021 for the first two quarters of fiscal year 2021-2022. The hospital has received communication regarding criteria for reimbursement for the last two quarters of the fiscal year.
- WRH has received funding confirmation from the Ministry of \$16.4 million for 32 acute medical/surgical beds and 5 acute mental health beds to be operational for the entire fiscal year.
- Funding amounting to \$709,800 has been received for an additional 3 acute medical/surgical beds to be in operation from October 1, 2021 to March 31, 2022.
- Funding confirmation has been received for the funding of 2 critical care beds.
- Hospital Operations November 30, 2021 Net Surplus/(Deficit) after building amortization (\$5,504,000).
- COVID-19 year-to-date results include \$2.5 million in COVID-19 extraordinary expenses that are ineligible for funding.
- The financial results (as appended) will detail the year to date revenues and year to date expenses.

6.2 Status of 2021-22 Budget Risk Items – November 30, 2021

Ms. Zimmer commented that with respect to the budget risk items, so far, predicting the same as in the previous month.

Operation Highlights:

- The operating results for the eight months ended November 30, 2021 resulted in a deficit of \$5,504,000 (\$185,000 positive Hospital Margin) based on the Ministry of Health (Ministry) definition. There are four items worth noting
 - a. Operating results include a combined \$35.6 million in higher costs and lost revenues attributable to meeting our clinical responsibilities related to COVID-19. The Ministry has confirmed that COVID-19 expenses will be reimbursed via the criteria applied in fiscal 2020-2021 for the first two quarters of fiscal 2021-2022 only. Hospitals have received communications regarding reimbursement criteria for the last two quarters of the fiscal year. Screening costs remain eligible for reimbursement, however some costs such as incremental PPE will no longer be reimbursed. Revenue is recognized when funding confirmation has been received.
 - b. WRH has received funding confirmation from the Ministry of \$16.4 million for 32 acute medical/surgical beds and 5 acute mental health beds to be operational for the full fiscal year. Both the revenue and expenses associated with the operation of these beds is included in the budget.

- c. WRH has also received funding of \$709,800 for an additional 3 acute medical/surgical beds to be operational from October 1, 2021 to March 31, 2022. The associated revenue and expense for these beds is not included in the budget.
- d. WRH has received confirmation of funding for 2 critical care beds. The budget assumes that we will be funded for a total of 8 critical care beds. The associated revenue and expense for 8 beds is included in the budget.

1. Financial Results for the Eight Months ended November 30, 2021 (Statement 2)

For the eight months ended November 30, 2021, the deficit after net building amortization is \$5,504,000, which is \$1,909,000 worse than plan. This represents a positive Ministry of Health Margin of \$185,000 (one year ago, the margin was negative \$4,791,000). Combined extraordinary operating expenses and revenue losses related to COVID-19 in the amount of \$35.6 million are included in these results. In the month of November, the COVID-19 impact was \$2.8 million. Below is a chart that shows the revenue losses and costs that have been incurred in the period April 1, 2021 to November 30, 2021 and which have been funded and or not funded (eligible and ineligible for funding under the new criteria).

It should be noted that with respect to Ministry volume based funding, we have unearned revenue for these eight (8) months of \$5 million as compared to \$6.1 million one year ago.

Revenue

Ministry revenue (combined base and one-time) is \$23.8 million higher than budget. The Hospital has received confirmation that incremental COVID-19 operating expenses incurred from April to October 2021 will be funded. One time funding is favourable year to date as it includes accruals for revenue for which we have received a funding letter or Ministry confirmation. One time funding includes the following accruals:

- \$6.2 million for April to September 2021 incremental COVID-19 expenses
- \$4.9 million COVID-19 physician payments
- ♣ \$9.1 million for Vaccination Centre expenses
- \$2.2 million for Nursing Externs
- 4 \$1.6 million in Assessment Centre per swab funding
- \$581,000 in Screening expenses (October & November 2021)

Originally, hospitals were informed that only costs for Vaccination Centres, patient repatriation and staff redeployment to long term care would be reimbursed through the COVID-19 incremental expense reimbursement process. The Ministry has now confirmed that incremental COVID-19 expenses for the first two quarters of the fiscal year will be fully reimbursed. As expected, for Q3 and Q4 only specific expenses (vaccination centres, assessment centres, patient repatriation and screening costs) will be funded. PPE purchases after October 1, 2021 are not eligible for reimbursement except in certain circumstances. The Ministry is gathering additional information from hospitals regarding PPE purchases and has made PPE supplies available to hospitals from the provincial stockpile at no cost.

The preferred accommodation revenue variance is unfavourable to budget by \$2,197,000. Lower occupancy due to the reduced number of elective surgeries contributes to this shortfall, as well as the Ministry of Health directive that hospitals cannot bill uninsured patients for semi-private and private accommodation during the pandemic. Previously, uninsured patients would have paid out of pocket for this accommodation. Infection prevention and control measures often require patients to be placed in private rooms and we are unable to bill for this accommodation in these circumstances.

Chronic Co-payment revenue is \$27,000 under budget due to the factors mentioned above for preferred accommodation.

Patient Services revenue variance is \$1,618,000 favourable (7.7%) year to date, with much of the positive variance attributable to uninsured patient revenue which is reimbursed by the Ministry at the interprovincial billing rate which is higher than OHIP rates. Previously many of these accounts would have been uncollectible. Diagnostic revenues are \$1,200,000 higher than planned as initiatives to address backlogs have been implemented. These revenues are offset by an increase in related medical staff remuneration.

Equipment Grant amortization is ahead of budget \$348,000 (17.2% favourable). Timing of equipment purchases affects this revenue.

Other Recoveries are \$1,363,000 favourable (4.8%) to budget. This revenue category is impacted by the reduction in hospital services earlier in the fiscal year. Revenues were significantly reduced for parking and retail food operations as volumes are lower due to visitation restrictions. These losses are offset by the combined surpluses in the retail pharmacies of \$2.1 million year to date.

Expenses

Salaries are currently over budget (unfavourable) by \$6,579,000 (3.8%) year to date November 30, 2021. Salaries for COVID-19 screening (staff, patients and visitors), staffing of the Assessment Centres and the Vaccination Centre total \$8,023,000 to date. The hospital has received confirmation of continued funding for 2 additional critical care beds over base and funding for 6 additional beds is expected. Therefore, the budget includes the revenue and expenses associated with 8 additional critical care beds operating for the full fiscal year.

Year to date spending for employees in paid isolation is \$187,000 and paid sick time due to COVID-19 is \$393,000. October and November saw significant increases in sick pay related to COVID-19 with \$135,000 and \$73,000 paid out respectively. Temporary hires (Nursing Externs) have been paid \$2,995,000 to date. Professions included in the Enhanced Extern Program include undergraduate medicine students, respiratory therapy students, paramedic externs and recently expanded to include internationally educated nurses. This program is funded by the Ministry and is in effect from January 1, 2021 to March 31, 2022.

Employee Benefits are unfavourable to budget by \$1,959,000 (4.5%). The variance is attributable to the higher than budget wage variance.

Employee Future Benefits are on budget.

Medical Staff Remuneration is over budget (unfavourable) by \$6,787,000 (19.2%). Of this variance, \$5.2 million is attributable to COVID-19 and will be funded through the temporary physician funding for COVID-19. This funding has now been extended to September 30, 2022. The remaining variance occurs in diagnostic services as the costs of earning additional patient services revenue.

Medical & Surgical Supplies are unfavourable to budget by \$2,216,000 (8.9%) year to date. The perioperative programs at both sites are favourable to budget by \$39,000 and is considerably reduced as compared to last month. This is due to the "ramp-up" of surgeries, particularly orthopedic and cardiovascular/thoracic as backlogs for these procedures are being addressed. The main source of the deficit is the overall increase in Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) throughout the hospital. Incremental costs for PPE are approximately \$22 per patient day higher than pre-COVID-19 rates and total

\$3 million year to date November 2021 when compared to pre-pandemic spending. As previously mentioned, PPE purchases after October 1, 2021 are not eligible for reimbursement.

It should be noted that elective surgery cancellations affect the ability to reach QBP funded volumes and may result in some funding having to be returned to the Ministry at year-end.

Drug expenses are unfavourable by \$1,600,000 (3.4%) year to date. Retail pharmacy revenues more than offset this budget deficit and have a favourable net drug expense to revenue of \$620,000. The chemotherapy suite and renal program drug expenses to revenues are balanced.

Supplies and Other Expenses are unfavourable to budget by \$8,862,000 (19%). Significant deficits are as follows:

- \$3,561,000 million in additional costs incurred for the e-Volve HIS project due to COVID-19 related delays in implementation
- \$3,128,000 for City of Windsor and Essex EMS Vaccination expenses
- \$1,818,000 for referred-out cataract cases
- \$778,000 for minor equipment purchases (COVID-19 related)

Most of these costs have been funded through COVID one time funding of QBP funding. Offsetting some of the other supplies deficits is a surplus of \$844,000 in utilities due to the ongoing electricity rebate.

Long Term Interest expense is balanced.

Equipment Lease/Rental is \$173,000 unfavourable (11.1%) to budget to date. This deficit is attributable to equipment rentals for the Screening, Assessment and Vaccination centres.

Equipment amortization is \$56,000 (.8%) under budget due to the timing of new additions.

Other Votes - Other Votes are \$24,000 favourable year to date.

Other Recoveries *I* (Expenses) – consistent with the prior year audited financial statement presentation, we have segregated the legal fees related to a particular legal case. Year to date November 2021, these expenses amount to \$24,000 and are unfavourable to budget.

2. Statement of Financial Position (Statement 3)

The Hospital continues to have challenges in trying to find suitable short-term investments for the cash balances on hand. Rates offered are lower than what we currently earn on accounts. Any increase in the prime rate will positively affect investment rates and additional opportunities to invest these funds.

Our Ministry / Ontario Health receivable has decreased by \$19.8 million from March 31, 2021. While we did receive the \$42.9 million in one time working capital funding accrued at March 31, 2021, the Ministry is slow to fund the eligible expenses for reimbursement related to temporary COVID-19 physician funding, Assessment Centre per-swab funding, Vaccination Centre, Screening and Nursing Extern funding and the confirmed amounts for the first two quarters' incremental operating expenses. In addition, \$3.6 million in one time funding has been accrued for the additional acute and critical care beds.

Through November 2021, the market value of the sinking fund has increased by \$1,679,000 (6.7%) since March 31, 2021. The underlying cost base as a result of realized investment gains has increased by \$100,000 since the original \$25 million investment was made.

3. Patient Volumes

Acute patient days are below target at both campuses with the Met Campus 2,341 below target and the Ouellette Campus 2,770 below target. Surgical cases are 2,889 under plan at the Met Campus and 1,674 below plan at the Ouellette Campus. These lower cases contribute to the lower patient days.

We are still working to obtain outpatient volumes from the new HIS system. Thus explaining why a few of the indicators show as "TBD".

4. Organizational Health

The percentage of sick time year to date for the Met Campus is 6.3%, which is over the target of 4.7% by 1.6%, while overtime is .85% over target at 3.2%.

Sick time at the Ouellette Campus is 6.3% compared to the target of 4.7%, while overtime is over target at 5.8% year to date compared to the target of 2.35%.

Some of the increase in sick time costs at both campus relates to paying staff to remain home in isolation due to COVID-19. As a matter of practice, when we have inpatient units on "outbreak" affected staff are sent home to self-isolate. We are also assuming some of the incidental sick time is staff dealing with childcare issues.

With respect to FTEs, the Met Campus is unfavourable to budget by 11.4 FTEs. At the Ouellette Campus, the FTE variance is favourable by 14 FTEs. Overall, the Hospital is 126.6 FTEs over budget with 129.1 FTEs attributable to the staffing requirements at the Assessment and Vaccination Centres to date.
