Our teams are <u>always</u> mindful that what might be a routine surgery from the hospital's point of view is actually a big procedure for our patient.

"Dr. Bisland has a wonderful bedside manner. He was able to put me at ease as he talked through the surgery and explained everything. And when I woke up, the first thing I saw was him smiling at me. I knew I was OK."

Three weeks after surgery Louie was back at work, and at the gym six weeks to the day after. Thanks to the rehabilitation plan, he can now do all that he could do before surgery, but without any of the pain.

Daily walks with his wife Tracy, their dog and keeping up with his grandkids is not a problem now! He's even thinking of getting back to skiing and on the ice!

Louie and his family have a long tradition of supporting the hospital. His late mom, Danila, was a dedicated supporter, who instilled in him and his sister Beverly, from an early age, to always give back.

Interview with the Doctor

Dr. Sajit Augustine is Chief of Pediatrics and a Neonatologist. We asked him to provide an update on the "Whole Body Cooling System" that donors like you generously helped to fund for the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit.

Can you tell us about the Whole Body Cooling System and how it helps patients?

When a newborn experiences oxygen deprivation or problems with blood flow at or around birth, they can end up with a type of brain damage called birth asphyxia.

Currently, there is no true cure for birth asphyxia. But we do know that cooling down the newborn's body can reduce the extent of permanent brain damage if it's done shortly after birth or the oxygen-depriving incident. It's called "hypothermia therapy."

That's where the Whole Body Cooling System comes in.

So the purchase of this equipment has been vital in caring for these newborns at risk?

Yes. In the past, Windsor NICU was not equipped to provide therapeutic hypothermia, so the baby had to be transferred to Detroit or to London.

There's a critical six-hour

window. The sooner hypothermia therapy begins, the greater the chance that the baby's potential disabilities will be minimized.



Supporting Windsor Regional Hospital is a family tradition for Ornella Bertoni Liburdi.

Over a decade ago, her father, Italo Bertoni, made a donation to help purchase a da Vinci Robot as part of the Windsor Cancer Centre Foundation's 'It's In Your Jeans' campaign for prostate cancer treatment.



Sadly, many of Ornella's mother's family members have died of cancer over the years, including her aunt. Then in October 2022, her father was diagnosed with glioblastoma – a cancerous tumour in his brain. He received exceptional care at Windsor Regional Hospital.

So the entire family cares passionately about early detection, treatment, research and support programs for people facing a battle with cancer.

Ornella herself is part of the high-risk breast screening program. Two years ago, when she visited the mammography suite to have her breast screening done, she realized that the gowns were old and badly needed replacing.

Thinking back to the donation her dad had made 10 years before, Ornella and her mom and sisters decided to match the gift



he'd given in order to purchase new gowns for women attending screening.

Their company, Bertoni Chairs and Things, made a corporate donation of \$5,000, and the family matched it.

"We've been in business for 38 years, and we've hired mostly women. I figured it was time to give back and help do something for women.

Screening is a difficult process to go through, but none of the therapies can help if you don't get that mammogram.

If the new gowns make women feel a little better when you're going to have your mammogram, that makes me happy."
