



"You saved my life."

Jessica Morrow began to feel really unwell last September. She was weak and nauseous.

At first, she thought she was simply overdoing it — with two kids, two jobs, and back in school full-time.

But she became worse. Her doctor sent her for tests, but waiting in her car for her results, she became so ill that she drove herself to the hospital.

The hospital did Jessica's bloodwork and instantly rushed her into care.

Jessica's kidneys were in failure. If she hadn't come in, she wouldn't have survived for another 24 hours.

Jessica was put onto dialysis that night. That's when Windsor Regional Hospital's Dr. Callaghan took one look at her and realized she had atypical uremic syndrome – an extremely rare blood disorder that he had studied extensively.

Jessica immediately began an intense and rigorous treatment plan.

Plasma three times a week. Infusions. She had to stop school, and stay in the hospital for a month.

Today, Jessica is on the list for a possible kidney transplant.

In the meantime, Jessica is sharing her story so that other people know how important Windsor Regional Hospital is – and how vital it is that we all support it.

"The care that I received from day one was incredible.

There were times when the doctor would



just come in and talk to me to tell me everything was going to be okay. Dr. Baga came in on his day off, and brought his kids with him, to check on me. Knowing how busy they are, they've been amazing.

I had nurses putting cold cloths on my head, on the back of my neck, rushing to get me water, running over to help before I passed out. Everything you can think of.

I've seen the dialysis nurses save countless lives — on a regular basis.

You have to be a special kind of person to do this work. It's like they never have a bad day.

Here's what I want donors to know: many hospitals don't have a plasma machine. Without that machine, I would be dead right now. And the hospital's supporters funded that machine."

"So if you ever wonder if your gifts make a difference – please know that you saved my life. And you're still saving my life, to this day."

It was November 2018 when my little girl, Megan, became sick. She was just two years old.

By December, she was gravely ill. Finally, blood tests confirmed a diagnosis that no parent wants to hear.

"Megan has leukemia."

The next day, Megan was rushed into the children's hospital in London, where a very kind Oncologist confirmed that she had cancer.

It was Christmas Eve.

Our world shattered.

That Christmas Eve, instead of opening the Christmas Pajamas waiting for her under the tree, Megan received her first dose of chemotherapy.

Her treatment continued for two and a half long years. A lot of that was at Windsor Regional Hospital. She loves the nurses, doctors and Child Life staff on the paediatric unit so much!

When it ended in 2021, we thought back to that first Christmas Eve – and we knew that we wanted to do something to spare other families from feeling so alone.





So we launched the idea of the "Mighty Megan and Friends Holiday PJs in the Hospital" campaign.

Our goal was to bring a little magic to the kids spending the holidays in hospital. And to their families.

With the support of so many friends and families, we were able to deliver holiday PJs to Windsor Regional Hospital and five other hospitals serving children. It is heartwarming to know that kids sleeping in hospital beds on Christmas Eve are able to receive a gift of warm and cozy new pajamas.

But by the following April, Megan had relapsed – and she began another two years of intensive treatment.

The next year, in 2023, Megan's friend Lauren did something beautiful. For her own birthday, instead of gifts, she asked friends and family to donate to Mighty Megan and Friends Holiday PJs Campaign.

Together, Megan and Lauren teamed up, fundraised and proudly delivered holiday PJs for all the kids in those hospitals once again!

Megan knows firsthand how a little holiday magic can make you forget about your treatments for a little while. And we are thrilled to add just a little bit of magic to families going through a really difficult time.
